I recently attended a party thrown by Bill and Emilie Highley to celebrate his mother's ninetieth birthday. It was a lavish affair with a sumptuous table, flowing champagne and live entertainment in the form of an Elvis impersonator. Elvis was a big hit with all of the revelers and, the next day, his performance got me thinking about visionaries.

There have certainly been some renowned examples of visionary zeal in my lifetime. John Kennedy immediately comes to mind for his decision to go to the moon, because, while he surely didn't see Silicon Valley as a direct descendant of that decision, he certainly foresaw that there would be a large commercial impact in the technological development that would enable achieving such a goal. Martin Luther King saw a better world for blacks and was a driving force in a civil rights movement that has created innumerable opportunities for minorities. Ronald Reagan was the first to see that government could not be the panacea for all ills. He ran for smaller, more efficient government as well as lower taxes and to this day, that platform is the standard by which most candidates are judged.

Here in Silicon Valley, we are blessed with what I think is one of the great business visionaries of my time. Steven Jobs founded Apple Computer based solely on his hobby as a technology wonk. I don't think that he foresaw the PC industry turning into the behemoth that it is, but then many folks in this valley have founded large, successful firms. What sets Jobs apart is that he left Apple, stumbled with Next, but then hit the long ball again with Pixar, a pioneer in the field of computer generated animation. During Jobs' absence, Apple became an also ran in the computer industry which this writer predicted would gradually disappear from the scene. Instead, after years of floundering, the company brought Jobs back and under his guidance, the now flourishing company has offered up numerous stylish and innovative computer designs (colors no less!), specialized software applications (digital photography, music) and ancillary computer oriented products (the

company's Ipod is the hottest thing in the marketplace.) In an era of obscene overpayment of CEOs, Jobs is one of the few worthwhile examples of how valuable a single man can be to a company.

Another hot visionary at this moment is none other than Michael Moore. Moore is the Oscar winning director of documentaries who made his first big splash with 1989's "Roger & Me," wherein he debuted his ambush/confrontational style of documentary journalism. Last year he won the Academy Award for the anti-NRA "Bowling for Columbine" and he has just released "Fahrenheit 9/11" which, after its opening weekend, is already the highest grossing documentary in the history of Hollywood. He specialized in performances that centered on making the audience so uncomfortable, they were ready to explode with appreciation when he finally gave them something to enjoy. One of his all time classics is the routine he did on Saturday Night Live wherein he stood next to a cheap record player while it played the "Mighty Mouse" theme song. The seconds tick by, the song reels off, Kaufman just stands there, you wonder what the hell is going on then, finally, Kaufman, with vaudevillian verve, lip-syncs, "Here I come to save the day," and brings the house down.

I am sure you are asking yourself why I have included Kaufman, a semi-successful comedian who has been labeled a "pop-cultural prankster and entertainment terrorist" and who died at the age of 35, with two other men who are clearly giants in their respective fields. To answer that, I have to talk about another comedy routine of Kaufman's. He came on stage in the persona of "foreign man," which is also the character he used in playing Latka, the mechanic in the TV series, "Taxi." He proceeded to do a series of truly awful impressions. Imagine Latka doing takes on Cary Grant and Jimmy Cagney. The tortuous impressions go

This month we're welcoming our first Cayenne owning members and we have 2 of them! When the Cavennes became available in the US last year, I wondered when we'd get our first Porsche SUV owners. I heard from one dealer in San Jose that over 50% of their new vehicle sales were for Cayennes.

I decided to gather some statistics of the LPR membership to see what everyone was driving. The listing I receive from PCA National only lists one car for each member and I know that many members own more than one Porsche (lucky dogs!). So based on a membership of 293, here are the statistics: 57% 911's, 11% 356's, 9% Boxsters, 7% 944's, 5% 914's, 5% 912's, 2% 968's, 2% 928's, 1% 924's and 1% Cayennes. 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



Tom & Annie Holdych trailered their new racecar down to Laguna Seca on Friday afternoon. Greg Sickal and I followed along in our cars. Although we hit a lot of traffic from Gilroy to 156, we made good time through Salinas, and set up camp at Laguna Seca by 5:00 pm. You may not have known that there was camping available, and for big events, it's hard to get. Fortunately there were some sheltered spots available (it gets very windy), with a view of the track.

We were able to get our cars checked Friday night by Pete Siemens. We off-loaded some of our stuff and went back up to camp. Tom & Annie had brought some MRE (military-style meals) Barbequed Ribs. This was a package big enough to feed eighteen. Sure. We were all a little skeptical, but the (Mc)ribs were pretty good, and it went well with the corn-on-the-cob and fruit that Annie had brought. Later that evening Pete and his son Eric came up and stayed at our campsite. We got to

talk about the track and Greg asked about a million questions! This was Greg's first Driver's Ed. event, whereas Tom, Annie & I had gone to the first event at ThunderHill in April. We felt very expert.

The next morning Tom woke and started breakfast. It was a classic "pancakes & bacon" breakfast, and we indulged heartily. Pete and Eric were quite surprised at our preparedness and especially Tom's ability to whip up gourmet meals on a campfire.

Cars were lining up to get onto the track at 6:00 am. We drove down to the track at about 7:30 am. We were in no hurry since we had "tech'd" the night before. The driver's meeting was at 8:15 and JJ (John Jeffries recently of LPR), introduced the staff: stewards Ed Shih and John Houston, Competition Directors Steve Taty of MBY and Pete Siemens of LPR, Registrar and Webmaster Liz Shaw of LPR, and last but not least, Chief Instructor Hank Watts, also an LPR member. Hank took all the novices into the classroom for orientation. He reviewed the meaning of the flags, and covered the rules for passing. Passing is only allowed in the straights, never in the turns, and ONLY with a signal from the driver being passed. This is to ensure there are no surprises and to minimize danger and potential damage.

There were 4 run groups with 25 cars in each run group. Two of those run groups were novices. There were 25 instructors for the groups and they had to switch back and forth between novices' cars and their own cars. They are all volunteers, and it is obvious that they love to help people learn to drive fast. Of course, they like to drive even faster! I took a ride with John Teaseley, my instructor for Saturday, and with

John Jeffries on Sunday. I was amazed at how much faster they could drive with very similar cars to my own. I guess that's why they're the instructors and I'm the student.

Annie Holdych and I were in the Novice 2 run group, while Tom Holdych

and Greg Sickal were in Novice 1. The only unfortunate thing was that the first Novice 1 run was shortened because SpeedsterFest was going on and what seemed like a thousand Speedsters and 356's got to drive around the track starting at 10 am. There were cars from all over the US and Canada.

There were Speedster lovers from all over the world, even a couple from Belgium. This was quite an event. It seemed like every Speedster ever built was at Laguna Seca celebrating the Speedster's 50th Anniversary. There were several prototypes and very rare cars, like the America

My instructor for Saturday, John Teaseley was really great. He was very tolerant of the difficulties I had hitting the apexes, and encouraged me to try again at the next turn. I could feel my confidence (and speed), build as I began

to get the timing down. We were all starting to feel more comfortable. There were no major incidents, but during our Novice debrief we were

chastised as a group for not doing a better job signaling for passes. I think Hank's words were "This is the worst group I've ever seen" or something close to that. After that, we all tried very hard to let anyone that came up behind us get past at the first safe point.

My wife Karen had some difficulty finding the racetrack and finally arrived about 1:00 pm. She was so relieved to have arrived that she immediately went shopping!

By the end of the day I was exhausted! I had to exit early on my last session because I had started to miss apexes and brake points-just generally screwing up, and my instructor asked if I was alright. Apparently I wasn't, so I told him I would cut the session short and go in. He complemented me on that decision.

Karen and Annie left to go on an "all girls tour" to Malibu with Sue Sickal the following day. We had a nice barbecue and beer celebration in the pits hosted by Coastal Driving. Greg eventually had to leave because Sunday was all booked and, try as he might, he could not convince Liz to let him in. It really isn't her fault, Greg, the track has a 25 car limit and was all booked-up! I'm pretty sure Greg will register for both days next time...

That night we had Pete and Eric, Cat Siemens and Evan Williams, and John Teasely, my Saturday instructor, all staying at our campsite. I think

it was better than in the pits where they had planned to stay. Of course it's not saying much that camping with us is better than "the pits". We had a great time re-hashing the days events and complementing one another. My big contribution Saturday night was supplying the S'mores, which are always a big campfire hit.

The Sunday sessions went very well. Tom and I both felt we were getting smoother, and hitting the correct points on the track more often. Evan Williams was my morning instructor and he was very positive and helped me focus on being smooth and hitting apexes. Now I was

only missing them about half the time. It really takes a lot of patience to be a good instructor. My afternoon instructor was Ken Mack (original owner of Ken's Sportech). He was very clear about what we would be working on (smoothness and hitting apexes, sounded pretty familiar), and I felt very com-

fortable, and made good progress. Except for taking turn 3 once without using my brakes (Ken was sure trying to brake for me, though), I did pretty well. Ken showed me a really good way to get around turn 9. While we're discussing turn 9, Tom Holdych was coming into that turn pretty fast, and got to experience his first spin! It was fine, he did what he was supposed to do ("both feet in", ask him), and he didn't hit anything. In fact he was most disappointed that he didn't have his video camera on at the time!

I was so excited at the prospect of driving the track at Laguna Seca! I've wanted to do this since 1973. I was not disappointed. The format of Driver's Ed. is great because you have an instructor in the car, and they help you learn the course, pick the braking points, find the apexes, and generally help you learn to drive your car on the track in a safe and controlled manner. That sounds a lot tamer than it really is! You go as fast as you can while maintaining control of the car, and I can tell you, it's a lot faster than you thought you could drive safely. The Coastal Driving instructors are the best! They are all well-trained and very encouraging. The entire staff of Coastal Driving is excellent, and many of the staff and instructors are members of LPR. Thanks to all the instructors and staff of CDS for a wonderful experience. Let's do it again!



Even though the crowd was a little small, I think everyone


enjoyed each other's company. It was nice to have the chance to talk to just about everyone there, while enjoying delicious barbecued beef,








49th Porsche Parade Diary
