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

Driver's Education is aptly named. Our Easter Sunday sessions at ThunderHill were quite an education for us novice drivers. Everyone involved had a great time. I encourage you to give it a try. If you're ready to try DE, there is a Sacramento Valley Driver's Ed event at ThunderHill coming up on June 4th. Coastal Driving hasn't scheduled our next DE event yet, but when they do we'll get the word out.

The Swap Meet at PartsHeaven will be Sunday, June 6. I hope you can make it! We have a large number of 912's, 914's, R's and replicas that will be on display, and we're expecting about 30 Concours entrants. If you've ever wondered about concours or toyed with the idea of entering your car, this is the time to do it. Call or e-mail me for more information. As always, the swap meet will have a large number of booths selling all kinds of parts (even whole cars), PartsHeaven will be open for business, and the food booth will be in full swing. It's gonna be an event to remember. Thanks to Jim & Jennifer Bryant for taking the lead on the Swap Meet, and Ralph Maines for being the resident advisor. I think Kevin Bennett will be manning the food booth, and Liz Shaw the Membership booth so be sure to support them and help if you can.

And now the saga continues...

When we last spoke, I had purchased the "Junkyard Dog" (a 1982 Burgundy 911SC Targa) from PartsHeaven and had drained out the excess oil. I was hoping to take it to the DE and to be able to get it smogged. Both of those things came to pass-the DE was GREAT, but I missed the last run because the "J-dog" began to backfire. Eric Siemens loaned me a couple of spark plug wires enabling me to limp home. Once I replaced the whole set, she seemed to run fine. I took her in and passed smog with no problems (I recommend Smog Check on Bascom Ave. if you need a "test only" station-the DMV assigns 15% of the smog checks to

"test only"-they can't do any smog repairs), of course I took it to Don at CT Automotive BEFORE taking the smog check-due diligence paid off. I had a couple of days of blissful driving until...she started backfiring again! Tom Holdych came over to help troubleshoot it. We thought it might be an airbox leak, but Tom did some additional research on the Pelican BBS and found that the O2 sensor relay often causes these kinds of symptoms. Through some clever troubleshooting, Tom confirmed the relay was bad (he removed the relay cover and manually connected the points-the car no longer backfired), and I installed a new one. Pete Siemens reminded me that he had previously said that the O2 sensor relay was sometimes the cause of rough running/backfiring.

So back to work on the '79 Targa that has been in rebuild mode since early February. To make a long story short, we got the motor in, out, and back in again (I had neglected to install the breather hose before putting the motor in the car-so we had to take it out, install the hose, and put it back in). It's easier to install the motor if you don't trap one of the front heater hoses above the starter, by the way. Another trip to PartsHeaven, a new hose, and a few more minutes to finish that.

Tom & I hooked up the various connections to the motor, Pete came over to help reassemble the CV joint so that it operated properly, but when I went to start it, the clutch pedal was on the floor! I took apart the linkage at the transmission, but nothing changed. My fear was that I had not hooked up the throwout bearing to the fork properly, and that I'd have to pull the motor out again. Tom wisely advised to quit for the day, and try again tomorrow. I came back with a clear head, took the linkage apart, put the clutch pedal up where it should be, and assembled the linkage again. I adjusted the clearance as it said in the book, and what do you know? The clutch was fine! You have to start with the clutch in the correct position (duh).

I took her out for a spin. She smoked like crazy at first (new motors do that). I took her up Hicks Road at full blast. Feels good! Those sticky tires sure are fun. Uh-oh, it started to miss-I quickly realized that I had forgotten to add gas and I had left about 1 gallon in it when I started the engine rebuild. I nursed it back down to the gas station (coasting the last few feet). I took her over to Tom's house to show her off and to see Annie's (Tom's?) new 1987 Carrera race car!

President's Notepad...

The '79 ran great! Powered up & down hard to seat the rings. The next morning I took her to work. During the night I had woken wondering if I had torqued the CV joints. I remembered doing the right side while Pete was there, but not the left. I must have, I thought to myself. WRONG ANSWER! On the way to work the left side CV joint came loose just as I turned on to the onramp to 85. I noticed a large bumping sound and no throttle response. The CV had come loose and turned the throttle linkage into a pretzel, shearing off the linkage on the tranny and breaking

the ball end on the linkage on the motor. I guess that's kind of a mechanical fuse. Anyway, I had an extended wait for a tow truck, and another trip to PartsHeaven for the throttle parts. I worked on it the rest of the day. I finally got it back together (with Loctite on the CV bolts), and running again. Life is good.

Now it's time to start working on the '82-I didn't tell you yet about the rear heater hose catching fire...

Disingenuous; adjective. Not ingenuous, lacking in frankness, candor or sincerity; insincere; also, giving a false impression of simple frankness.

As an amateur word smith, vocabulary has always been quite important to me. Even as an adolescent I had to be careful about picking up a dictionary because it was easy for me to lose myself in the process of looking up a word; in no time I could find myself browsing the pages as one would a magazine. I was a big reader in those years and, fortunately or unfortunately, authors like Poe and Dickens forced me to prowl the pages of Webster's with a fair degree of regularity.

Disingenuous: I learned the meaning of this bit of vocabulary comparatively recently, certainly within the last 15 to 20 years. I remember quite clearly my first noticed exposure to this word. It didn't come from some grand work of literature; it came from the news. It was quite surprising that the lesson came so late in life because I have certainly tended toward cynicism since the age of sixteen or so, and disingenuous is the perfect word for a cynic since it is almost always used in conjunction with a story about a person or company that literally trades on trust with the public.

"Apple...says publicly that its retail stores pay the same dollar amount for its products that independent resellers do." Mercury News, April 23, 2004. This is from a story about independent retailers contending that Apple Computer favors its own stores by giving them better deals for Apple's products than are given the independents. It is a classic example of disingenuousness. It is an attempt to seem earnest and forthright in answering the accusations, but is clearly qualified in the tortuous phrasing, "pay the same dollar amount." This leaves the door wide open for rebates, bonuses and any other financial folderol that Apple might wish to give to its own retail outlets while withholding them from the independents, but leaves the incautious reader with the impression that Apple is indeed playing fair and that the independents are all full of apple sauce.

"There was no infection." This statement was issued by the White House when Ronald Reagan had a cancerous growth removed from his nose. It was disingenuous. The spokesman was attempting to reassure the American people through misdirection. It was blatantly obvious what they were trying to do, they probably fooled no one and the whole idea was downright stupid.

"I did not have sex with that woman." President Bill Clinton. This is a much more insidious example of being disingenuous. There is no qualification, no misdirection, just the straightforward assertion. Most people would now regard this statement as a lie, but I am confident that in Bill Clinton's mind he was just being disingenuous. This is because the statement was based on Clinton's extremely stilted, self-serving, personal definition of another word; sex. That's the big problem with attorneys and politicians, they can rationalize any behavior and argue that it is legitimate no matter how outrageous the claim, which is why the d-word often applies so aptly to them. Clinton got exactly what he deserved for also being downright stupid.

Last year, Cruz Bustamante asserted that it was legal for him to circumvent California campaign law and take the \$3 million from the tribal gaming interests. I think he was being disingenuous because he knew his position was one of those self-serving, lawyerly rationalizations. In my opinion, what he really thought was that he could argue it was legal, he could spend the money, get elected and then if he got nailed in court, he could apologize and just deal with a fine... a pretty good deal, if it worked. Unfortunately for Cruz the courts uncharacteristically dealt with the matter in record time and found against him while the campaign was still on, thereby effectively sinking Bustamante's cruise to the governorship.

Finally, the nation is drowning in spam. I just heard from a club member who scrapped his email address because he was getting so much spam that he just couldn't deal with it anymore, yet all the Internet and computer systems powerhouses say that they are dead set against spam yet are powerless to stop it. I think that they are being, yup, you guessed it... disingenuous! How hard would it be to put a foreign language filter into an email system? Microsoft could do it in a heartbeat, as could Earthlink. This alone could knock out 10% of my spam. Existing spell-check and grammar-check software would catch all the v.i.a.g.r.a.

type spam, as well as foreign language spam, and thus eliminate even more, but the powers that be don't give you the option to use them to filter incoming email. How about charging the sender a penny per outgoing message and giving every account the first 1000 messages/month free? Make every Internet Service Provider sign on to the plan or cut off their access to the email system. This would kill the spam overnight. These solutions are not being offered because the companies that could and should do it, along with our Congress, which should be mandating it, are all sitting on their hands until they can a make some money on it, which, I assume, is what they really want no matter what they disingenuously assert to the public.

Unfortunately, deceit is a common practice among individuals, companies, organizations and even governments, so we have learned to live with it. Additionally, there is something in the American psyche that differentiates between outright lies and mere attempts to mislead. Maybe it is our love of games, and this form of deceit is, after all, just a word game. You can, however, learn to watch for the signs and think about what you are being told. You can be pretty sure, for example, that when someone says, "To the best of my recollection..." whatever comes next is going to be something less than ingenuous.

So if you are not a natural cynic, try it for a few days. See if you can spot some disingenuous statements. But be careful, you just might get hooked and then you could end up being a curmudgeon, like me.

Welcome to LPR, everyone! Oh, one more important announcement: CONGRATULATIONS to Mike Lommatzsch and his new wife, Marcia.





History Park at Kelley Park

Outside the San Jose Historical Museum, in Kelley Park, a 115-foot tall replica of the Light Tower now stands. The 25-acre museum consists of a village of 28 historic buildings, either restored or replicas, that recreate neighborhoods of San Jose from the 1880s to the 1920s.

Visitors can ride past the buildings in restored trolley cars, walk through the parks within the museum grounds, and tour the buildings with a docent.

Poet Edwin Markham's home is restored there, part of a row of Victorians. A few blocks away, visitors can see the Ng Shing Gung temple. Known as the "Temple of Five Gods," it was originally built in 1888 in San Jose's Heinlenville Chinatown, named after John Heinlen, who leased property to Chinese-Americans at the time. Ng Shing Gung was a community center and a house of worship with a carved and gilded altar.

Other museum attractions include replicas of the Bank of Italy - the precursor to the Bank of America - and the Pacific Hotel, which hosts a gift shop and a gallery. Both are located Light from the across Tower, along with the building of most interest to the children: O'Brien's San Jose Candy Factory and ice cream store



Directions to Kelley Park: Take 280 or 680 south to Tenth Street, between 87 and 101. Go south to left on Keyes St., then right on Senter Road to the Kelley Park parking lot on your left.



The PCA Coastal Driving School provides a safe, structured and controlled teaching and learning environment for participants to improve their driving abilities, acquire a better understanding of vehicle dynamics and learn driving safety. 

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



we met for our drivers' meeting at 8:00. While the intermediate and advanced drivers went out on the track, we novices got about 90 minutes of classroom training. Hank covered the fundamentals of performance driving,

the meaning of the various flags, and some basic "do's and don'ts"." *Bob Morgan*

"The instructors provided wireless headsets for communicating with their students on the track and having a re-assuring instructor's voice in your ear at every turn was a confidence builder as the day went on." *Joe Pruss*

"The situation at tech was challenging: Thankfully Chairman Jefferies had opted for the early gate opening (6:30). Even at that, it took a while

"The afternoon sessions brought more confidence, and a bit of improvement, but I still

wanted to wait too long to downshift. I guess I'll have to come out again and make a little more progress." *Bob Morgan*

"Having rules and briefings during the day helped to get everyone using the important hand signals used for passing, and having an

observer on a platform with a green flag at every blind turn confirming clear sailing ahead allowed us to stretch out a bit as our confidence increased" *Joe Pruss*

"We had originally targeted our event for four run groups. About two weeks before the event, sign-ups were running a little lean. So, we decided

to go to three run groups. We announced this to the people registering, touting the great amount of track time. The number of instructor sign-ups was about right to support this. The meeting adjourned at 9:08 p.m.



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
