As you read this, we'll be getting ready to go to the 51st Porsche Parade in Portland, Oregon. Parade is an annual event, held each summer to celebrate Porsche and the Porsche Club of America. Usually the Parade location alternates between the West and East. Last year, the 50th Porsche Parade was held in Hershey, PA, and before that it was in Ft. Worth, Texas. The first Parade I attended was the 48th in Tampa, Florida. Some people make Parade their annual family vacation. There are a number of competitive events throughout the week of Parade. I plan to help with the Concours d'Elegance as a worker not a competitor. I'll also be working the Rallye. I actually have a number of relatives in Portland and thereabouts. Maybe I'll try to contact some of them while I'm in the area. About a year ago, Debbie and I were returning to San Jose by way of Highway 17 from the Santa Cruz area. We were in her GMC Envoy and, as is usually the case when we are out of town, I was at the wheel. We were driving along at right around the speed limit in the number 1 lane (commonly referred to as "the fast lane", though often not), there was no traffic to my left and immediately ahead of me was a motorcycle. I elected to move right into the number two lane and pass the cyclist on his right. As I accelerated into the new lane, the cyclist, whose vehicle was clearly more responsive than mine, also accelerated to stay even with me on the highway. I got to about ten miles over the speed limit and then backed off as I approached the rear end of other traffic in my lane. The cyclist did the same. I dropped to about five miles under the limit and the motorcycle did likewise, continuing to pace and block me as a gap gradually opened between my car and the other car in my lane. I tried accelerating again and, sure enough, the motorcycle adjusted his speed to continue blocking me from changing lanes. I commented to Debbie, "I must have done something to irk this guy because he is blocking me into this lane."

Have your heard about Intermittent Explosive Disorder? Contrary to what you might think, it has nothing to do with the venting of gas. The psychiatric community has completed its studies of what has, until now, been alliteratively called "road rage" and officially anointed a new mental condition. According to their conclusions, 16 million Americans are susceptible to Intermittent Explosive Disorder and may expect an average of 43 incidents per lifetime, and for those afflicted with this ailment the recommendation is treatment with antidepressants and... surprise... therapy.

I have always maintained a heavy skepticism about psychiatry. I have a strong inclination toward most branches of science, but not this one. One of the basic tenants of these hard sciences, however, is that claims to discoveries are only accepted as valid when they can be reproduced by other scientists.

Psychiatry, however, is a completely different animal. While I admit that this branch of health care has many valid and worthwhile functions, I find it hard to grant it the credibility of many other sciences because its practice in many ways seems more art than science. A perfect example of the paradox of psychiatry is the fact that, in our legal system, two different, equally qualified practitioners of psychiatry can examine the same subject and testify to opposite conclusions depending on whether they are being paid by the prosecution or the defense. That doesn't seem very scientific.

Being a cynic with a scientific bent, I can't help considering the cause and effect of the newly anointed Intermittent Explosive Disorder (IED). Now, when people do something stupid while driving in an angry mood, they will have one more means of attempting to absolve themselves of guilt and/or responsibility. In fact, any crime of passion will find this new discovery a godsend as a defense. More psychiatrists

It may be too callous to call the "discovery" of IED totally self serving to the mental health industry, but I have to say that it smacks of hucksterism. It is really not much different than when the deodorant industry got odor under control and then suddenly discovered the need to eliminate the "embarrassment of wetness." Anger will never go away, just like wet underarms never really went away, but now, a lot more money is going to be made off of it.

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So, I don't know if it was road rage, IED or just a bully on a bike, but there I was, finding myself in a situation where a motorcyclist seemed to be purposely blocking me into the "slow" lane on Highway 17. It didn't take long for me to react. Once I realized the situation, what I can only assume was my very own IED kicked in and I proceeded to slowly move my vehicle into his lane. The idiot honked his little horn at me, but I knew that his bike, which weighed hundreds of pounds, would have to yield to the Envoy, which weighed thousands. He dropped back behind me, apparently decided to get real and, fortunately for us both, it was only the confrontation that died right there.

I don't know if what I did was right or wrong, but I have to say that it still feels right. The Darwin Principle could certainly have come into play in that clash of wills, as anyone who thinks that they can push SUVs around while riding a motorcycle is almost terminally stupid. I suppose it could be said that it was equally stupid of me to push the guy out of the lane, as I could have just outlasted him. But he made me mad, and folks do dumb things when they are mad. 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



Checking Oil Level, Air-Cooled 911 Models

by Paul Lighthill, Riverside Region, reprinted from Porsche Gedanken

What is normally a very simple process is somewhat more involved on the 911 due to its dry sump lubrication system, which holds a relatively large amount of oil. According to the 911 owner's manual, to check the oil level correctly, the engine must be completely warmed up to operating temperature. Typically, this requires a minimum of 15 minutes of driving. The car must be stopped on level ground with the engine idling for at least 30 seconds prior to checking either the oil level gauge on the dash or the dipstick in the oil reservoir.

If the car is moving or the engine is above idle speed, the gauge on the dash will not give an accurate reading. If the engine is not fully warmed up, the readings on both gauge and stick will be low. If oil is added to a cold engine, upon warm up, overfill can cause smoking and even engine damage.

The range both on the gauge and between the high and low marks on the dipstick is 2 quarts. It is recommended to keep the level in the middle, or one-quart low.

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
