Well our first board meeting of 2006 was very well attended! Everyone was having such a great time catching up after the holidays that we could hardly get the meeting started. Just so you know, anyone is welcome to attend our monthly board meetings. They are normally at Mountain Mike's Pizza on Santa Cruz Blvd. in Los Gatos on the first Thursday of the month. The meeting starts at 7:00pm and ends about 8:30pm. Our next meeting will be on February 2nd, and if you'd like to have a slice of pizza with us (there is an optional donation of \$3 per person), you are more than welcome. The purpose of the board meeting is to review the upcoming events, check our monthly financials, and discuss any issues that may arise as the board members and chairpersons report on their respective areas. You can always check the minutes in the POST to see what we've covered. Again, you're welcome to attend if you like.

One thing we did at the last board meeting was review our 2005 budget. We did a good job staying on budget last year. The events paid for themselves, and we made enough money at the swap meet to cover the family picnic and some of the expenses for the year-end party. The 2005 financials will be published in a later edition of the POST. Speaking of the POST, we do spend about \$9,000 each year to publish it. We have about \$3,000 in advertising, and we rely on the rebate from PCA to cover the remainder. We haven't changed our advertising prices since the mid 1990's so we decided to increase the prices by about 10% for 2006. We REALLY appreciate our advertisers. Many have been advertising in the POST for a dozen years or more. Not only do they help fund the POST, but they always contribute door prizes for our picnic and year-end party. At the next Board meeting I'm going to suggest that we allocate \$2 per person from the price we charge for each event to go to cover the POST. We do advertise all our good-time-gatherings, tours, autocrosses, driver's education, etc. in the POST, so it seems fair that those events should share that cost. We'll see what happens.

Enough of the business-side, let's talk about something more fun. By the time you read this, we will have had the Zone 7 Awards Banquet, as well as our first event at CB Hannigan's in Los Gatos. I hope there is a write-up and pictures this year!

We have reserved 8 dates for Autocross at the Marina Airport, and Coastal Driving has 5 dates for Driver's Education events this year at Buttonwillow, Infineon (Sears Point), and Reno-Fernley. Thunderhill and Laguna Seca are all booked, but something may open up during the season. I sure hope I'll be able to do a lot more driving this year than last!

GGR has an autocross school coming up, and if you've never been to an autocross school, it is REALLY GREAT! Even if you don't intend to autocross your car, the driving skills you learn at this school will amaze you. I have to warn you about tire wear at this event, though. You will use up the equivalent of a couple thousand miles in a single day.

By the way, the Porsche Parade is in Portland, Oregon this year. The information was in the November Panorama, and on-line registration is scheduled for March. I'm sure there will be many people from the West Coast wanting to participate, so be sure to sign-up on the first day. In addition to the Concours and Autocross, I think they're planning to have some driving events at Portland International Raceway. Don't miss it.

Cecil Beach of Bodystyle wil be hosting a tech session on insurance & body repairs. I urge you to attend this tech session as it will leave you better prepared if you are ever in an accident. There are lots of changes in the body repair industry and you may not be as well-covered as you think. Take it from me.

While we're on the subject, there is no news regarding the Silver Fox and the Junkyard Dog. They are parked in my driveway and garage waiting for me to get my ____ in gear. I'm going to have to get busy if I expect to drive a Porsche to any of the LPR events this year!

Kevin Bennett, Editor

A few days ago my son, Chris, recruited me to give him a hand on a bathroom repair job that he was doing to a house in San Jose. I was only a few weeks past shoulder surgery and my main reason for being there was to provide advice on the removal of an old window frame, awkward because of stucco exterior walls, and installation of a replacement dual-pane window. My son had told me that the home belonged to a San Jose State professor, the second professor for whom he had worked in his short handyman career, and as I stood around looking at the living area of this relatively small house, I couldn't help noticing that the only entertainment center was a book case containing nothing but books. The family room was filled with a large dining room set and the living room was equipped with comfortable looking couches and such, and there was no television to be found. As a college professor, it seemed clear to me that the owner of this house was uninterested in having a distraction in the house that was capable of sucking many hours a day from more intellectual pursuits.

As a retiree, I have found that I devote far too many hours in the day to "the idiot box." It would be embarrassing to reveal just how much time I spend watching, especially because it seems that most of the time that the TV has my attention is devoted to trying to find something interesting to watch. In retrospect, I can safely say that I have done little to maximize any intellectual proclivities over my lifetime in large part due to the ready distractions provided by television.

There is no doubt that the United States is an intellectually lax society. Math and science have traditionally been the U.S. student's forte, yet in 2003 we ranked 18th when compared to 23 other nations. In 2005 the State of California once again postponed the requirement that students pass an exit exam in order to receive a diploma and it was certainly not because *too many* students were going to pass. The obesity problem is evidence that these students are being distracted from their studies by passive entertainments and television, movies and video games are almost surely the culprits. As these youths mature in to adulthood, many rely on these same mass media as the primary source of continuing education.

Several generations of "lazy intellectuals", a class in which I include myself, have grown up thinking that they can be adequately informed by the mass media. People will watch a movie like *Dances with Wolves*, clearly a paean to the Lokata Sioux, and feel that after their three hours of serious study in a movie theater, they are sufficiently informed to judge the Sioux culture to be superior to the one that superseded it. Large audiences treat talk radio as a serious intellectual pursuit rather than the almost carnival entertainment that it usually is. Sonny Bono, whom many judged to be an intellectual lightweight, ran for the U.S. Senate in California and found himself crucified for admitting to forming opinions based on news reportage that he'd seen on TV.

Interestingly, his ex-wife, Cher, who never even graduated high school, considers herself sufficiently informed to judge our current president to be, in her words, "stupid."

The television industry has of course attempted to mitigate the damage attributed to its programming. Vast sums of money are lavished on "news" departments whose mere existence, it is argued, performs a public service by "informing" the viewer while in actuality the news shows' primary function is to air celebrity oriented sensationalism, because that is what gets ratings.

The fact that we are a republic allows for a certain amount of intellectual egalitarianism; after all, if you can vote, you can have an opinion. I would like to think that I am more informed that some and I know that I am certainly less





Directors' Reports

President: Bob Morgan

The Zone 7 awards banquet is on January 14th and will be held in Pleasanton. If any one would like to go, they should contact Bob after the meeting.

POST advertisers need to be contacted. Jennifer will invoice advertisers for the year. Bob will also follow up with the advertisers on payment.

Autocross: Alan Gale
