I saw an interesting news story about Lincoln Hall, an Australian mountain climber, who succumbed to altitude sickness near the summit of Mt. Everest. He was abandoned by his two Sherpa guides who both maintained that they had to leave him in order to save themselves. Hall was declared dead but, lo, the next day he was rescued and helped down to safety with the help of a few, presumably, other Sherpas and their faithful yak.

Just to make the story more interesting, the network included a reference to a British climber on the same peak who, less than two weeks prior, also succumbed to oxygen starvation on a well traveled route near the summit. David Sharp, only 33, lost his struggle to breathe as over three dozen other climbers ignored him as they pursued their own goal of conquering the great mountain. He must have been incredulous in his death throes as potential savior after savior moved past him while offering no succor. Sharp died because others were unwilling to share their precious oxygen reserves with him.

The spirit of competition is strong in America, and it is evidenced in the myriad competitive activities available to its people. They run the gamut from tic-tac-toe to professional sports and include competitions as varied as cooking, animal and plant breeding, wheel chair racing, and yes, even competitive car washing. Because the desire to win is so ingrained in our society, I imagine that in even the most oddball of these competitions there is a certain amount of cut throat activity. I think that John Madden succinctly summed up the prevalent attitude when he said, "I would rather wear a tutu than come in second."

I am a poker player, and as such, I have to have a callous attitude toward my opponents at the table. In order to succeed, I cannot concern myself with whether or not the folks whom I beat are losing their rent money. Fortunately for me, my years as a businessman, being hustled and scammed by customer and employee alike, gave me a strong predilection toward insensitivity. It's not something of which to necessarily be proud, but my callous nature certainly flavored my reaction to the Everest story.

I am not a thrill seeker. I don't rock climb, skydive, hang glide, scuba dive, or even autocross. I didn't avoid these activities out of fear, but for the combined reasons that; 1) even modest injury could have had a major impact on my business and 2) I was really not interested. Because I avoided them, whenever I heard stories of tragedies associated with these activities, I was quick to dismiss them as self induced. I am finding that this particular attitude changes a bit when you actually know someone who has suffered dire consequences while thrill seeking, but to this day, my initial response is always on the callous side, and once again, the thrill seeking nature of the Everest tragedy influenced my reaction.

I would imagine that for most of the three dozen climbers who bypassed Sharp on that treacherous peak, their Everest adventure was a once in a lifetime endeavor; one

that was undertaken at considerable expense. My callous nature identifies with them rationalizing that stopping to help would jeopardize both their own lives as well as their hopes of reaching, or descending alive from, the summit. I can hear in my own mind the thought processes that must have been in their heads as they absolved themselves:

"This guy isn't my responsibility. He knew the risks. Somebody else will help him. Why should I give up my bragging rights about conquering Mt. Everest for a guy I don't even know?"

At twenty-five thousand feet, perhaps you have to give the benefit of the doubt to the climbers who allowed Sharp to die. The single minded determination to reach the summit combined with their own oxygen starved condition might certainly have interfered with their good judgment. Despite my callous nature, however, I think that had I been one of those three dozen climbers, I might have stopped and rendered assistance to the dving man. If you think about it, when it comes to bragging rights, "I sacrificed reaching the summit in order to save the life of a fellow climber," it seems to me, is at least as good, if not better, as saying you reached the top.



dawned sunny and beautiful with a light breeze and the temperature at the beach was perfect for a party.


