



Steady readers of this column may be aware that I play a lot of online poker. So the online poker rooms are trying to rally their cadres of gamblers to pony up even more cash to help underwrite the industry's lobbying effort to fight the reformers.

I did a little calculating quite a while back and estimated that during peak hours, the virtual poker room in which I play was making \$30,000.00 per hour in revenue from table rake and tournament fees. In chat room vernacular, I was LOL (laughing out loud) when I first saw the solicitation. I suppose there must be some greenhorns out there who responded with some cash, but my feeling is that the industry is generating such a staggering cash flow that it can and should pretty much take care of itself.

Thinking about all this, however led me off on an interesting tangent. I am almost coming to realize why people will expend so much money and effort in the attempt to achieve elected office. Where else could you be kicking back in your plush, leather executive chair, being hand fed delicious peeled grapes by an equally delicious legislative aide, come up with the idea to reign in online poker rooms and immediately start an avalanche of perks and money flowing into the campaign coffers of both you and your compatriots? Imagine the job satisfaction!

That is surely what is happening now. The poker rooms are hemorrhaging cash in a lobbying effort to derail the movement that is undoubtedly being underwritten by horse and dog racing interests as well as brick and mortar gambling houses who would prefer to see all those online table rakes going into their own drop boxes. It is such a lucrative arrangement for both the lobbyists and the congressmen that it is easy to understand why Congress is so slow to accomplish anything. The incentive for POST Positions...

these legislators to drag out the process as long as possible is almost irresistible because a final vote on any matter shuts off the river of lobbying cash flowing in their direction.

Remember our friend Jack Abramoff, the poster child of lobbyist corruption? He was doing his dirty work with \$75 million from tribal gaming interests. I have no doubt that some of that money was meant to influence online gaming regulations... and the direction of the influence would of course depend on whether those tribes owned just casino operations on their reservations, or whether they were partnered in the big online poker rooms.

When I was in the dry cleaning business, there was a lobbying effort made by my industry, along with numerous other small business chemical users, to enact federal regulations limiting what could be demanded by local governments

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regarding the level of soil pollution cleanup. The lobbying effort, and the solicitations for cash, went on for years. Every year, Congressman Gasbag would claim that this was the year, a final push, one more injection of cash would get the bill passed... yet nothing ever happened. The grassroots supporters of this initiative finally became disillusioned with the lack of progress and the unceasing demands for more money; the cash flow dried up and, lo, the bill never made it out of committee. One of the few positives to come out of the effort was a vastly enlarged cadre of certified cynics who now, like me, look askance at the machinations of our legislative branches.

I can only surmise that, following the demise of his soil pollution cleanup bill, old Congressman G. must have been kicking back, being hand fed a few grapes, cogitating on what industry he could rape next when thoughts of the internet and poker wafted through his mind and he had a brainstorm...




