For twenty years or so I have watched very little network television. The reason I chose to forego the networks' offerings had nothing to do with the quality of the entertainment; it was all about the number of commercials. I recognize that watching TV is just a means of wiling away the hours, but I just couldn't bring myself to spend almost a third of that time watching commercials. Now, however, thanks to the advent of the digital video recorder, I have been freed from the drag of relentless advertising and find myself spending much more time with the networks' bill of fare. An unfortunate consequence of this new freedom is that the DVR records entire series, if you so instruct it, and as a result of my choice to try and catch up some older shows in reruns, I find myself in a constant race to try and keep up with the relentless buildup of recorded programs on my system.

One of the keys to romantic plots is that there is something that is keeping the two potential lovers apart. No one seems to consider that taking the extraordinary measures to land a reticent potential mate might be going overboard or even possibly illegal. One of my favorite romantic comedies had Meg Ryan hiring a private detective to investigate Tom Hanks... kind of creepy if you think about it.

Of course, having never been a cop or a fireman, maybe I'm wrong... maybe they all congregate after work in that bar... but I doubt it.

Anyone who has driven in the city by the bay during the last forty years has to wonder how *Bullitt* managed to have a high speed pursuit of that black Dodge Charger through the streets of San Francisco. Recently, Matt Damon has used his *Bourne Identity* to rip up the streets of several major European cities and yet he never seems to find a traffic jam.

7. When stranded, cut off from civilization and in need of shelter, there is always an easily accessable, habitable cave nearby. 

Shirley had brought some tasty cheeses and crackers (one cheese from Ireland with walnuts was my favorite) to tide us over until lunch. How thoughtful!



# The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly

**The Bad** - a six foot tall aluminum bakery trolley got away from a grocery store worker and crashed into our pristine Boxster which was in the process of exiting a grocery store parking lot. It hit the passenger door then bounced to the front of the fender just behind the light and then bounced back to the middle of the fender where it slid to the ground.

A friend recommended a dent removal technician. We took the car to the Dent Expert and he said he could remove the dents but he didn't know whether or not his paint buddy could take care of the deep gouges in the paint. After examining the damage, his paint pal said he could do it; so we opted to go with this duo.

**The Good** - The dent expert Sal Contreras (www.homepage.mac.com/dentexpert) came to our house one morning and worked all day removing the dents with his eclectic collection of tools. It was fascinating watching him and we didn't accomplish a thing all day. By the end of a long day the dents were gone.

**More Good** - The painter - Patrick Carr came a few days later with paint, spray cans, compressor, heat lamps, fine sand paper, fans and rubbing compound. Once the sand paper and rubbing compound had removed the scratches in the paint, he began to paint and then dry the paint. Of course, the drying took a lot of time. After three hours the car was beautiful again.

And More Good - These men are truly fine craftsmen and we would definitely recommend them to others. The work was done at our home; so we could observe everything. Best of all, it was not necessary to paint such a large part of the car; so it is more "original".



When I arrived at Fremont Porsche about 9:30 there was a huge line of Porsches extending almost to the road, so many in fact I had a hard time finding a parking spot. I thought wow what a great turn out, but no, they were there for the free car wash. Here's a nice bit of info: Fremont Porsche along with the Mercedes Benz dealer next door have a free car wash every Saturday until 2pm. I only saw Benzs and Porsches in line and I got one of those

"you've got to be kidding" looks when I asked if I could bring my (OK, Jen's) Cherokee. So I think that means you better show up in your Benz or Porsche if you want to take advantage of the freebie.

Gunter Fieldmiester is the Service Manager at Fremont Porsche and graciously welcomed me to the showroom when I arrived. The tech session got underway a little late because Gunter and his chief service technician, Chris Smith, were fusing around trying to get their computer projector to cooperate. In the end they gave up and we all huddled around the laptop as Gunter started the talk after a brief introduction. Gunter started with a quick history of the dealership. It recently changed ownership and is now part of the Fletcher Jones Company . It was previously called Claridges. With the change in ownership came a change in attitude towards working with local clubs. Today

they are very active with the Diablo and GGR clubs, and hopefully, going forward, with our club also. Gunter told us the first Cayenne was released in 2003 as a 2004 model. Gunter admitted he is no longer completely immersed in the technical aspects of the

vehicles so he introduced us to Chris Smith and Chris began the technical talk.

I learned many things that morning and the first was that the Cayennes on the showroom floors today are 2008 models and referred to as "second generation". Porsche decided to skip a 2007 model and jump right to 2008. So if you see a 2007 Cayenne for sale, grab it, it's a collector's item! Chris began by explaining why Porsche came out with an SUV. Well other than the obvious (to make money), they decided a second family vehicle would most likely be a SUV. The thinking was that if a person already has a Porsche sports car, they will also need a "practical" vehicle to deliver the kids to

soccer practice, pull a trailer or boat and maybe even for an occasional family weekend camping trip. And so the Cayenne was born, ..... ok ..... created. The engine used in the Cayenne is the V8 engine Porsche developed as the replacement engine for the 928. The mid 90's were a very bad time for Porsche. They were almost bankrupted as a repercussion of the 924, 944, 928, and 968 era. In an effort to regroup, Porsche stopped making the front engine/rear drive cars and cut back to making a single car, the 993. Finances did stabilize and Porsche did get back on their feet. It's a good thing the 993 was such an exceptional car, because if it wasn't the Porsche company might have never survived. After that came the explosive sales of the Boxster, which gave Porsche plenty of working capital. As I mentioned previously, the V8 engine in the first generation Cayenne was slated as the 928's replacement. For use in the Cayenne it needed some heavy modernization. In the new models, the 2008s, the V8 has been heavily modified once again. In fact the new engine is almost a complete remake of the old. The essence of the first half of Chris's talk was to contrast the first generation Cayenne V8 with the second generation. The first thing Chris mentioned was that the displacement of the new V8 was increased by 0.3 liters. The new engine has the original variable valve timing on

the intake but now has variable valve timing on the exhaust valves as well. Another improvement was an increase in fuel pressure used to inject fuel into the cylinders. To compliment the increase in fuel pressure;, and given the huge increase in computing power available today, the Porsche engineers were able to better control the moment and the amount of the fuel delivered to each cylinder. This more precise fuel injection timing coupled with the variable valve timing that was added to the exhaust valves resulted in an increase of 50hp – with lower emissions and better fuel economy than the previous V8!

Not too much was said about the first generation V6 except that the new V6 (again a 2008 model) is superior to the previous generation.

Gunter told us about the time when he was invited to see the (then brand new) 2004 Cayenne in England. He said he drove 3 laps at Birmingham chasing a 911. He said it was an eerie feeling – as though it wasn't such a heavy vehicle and seemed quite nimble on it's feet, I mean tires. He said he also had a chance to drive a Landrover and a BMW X5, both of which were not up to the agility of the Cayenne although the BMW was not too far behind. Gunter told us one of the most uncomfortable demonstrations while he was in the vehicle was a 40 degree off camber U turn. He didn't say at what speed they took the U turn but he said he was white knuckled all the while. He also told us a funny story about a demonstration of the Cayenne's agility and stopping ability. It was a turbo

A few other bits of info from Gunter: the new Cayenne is able to drive in low 4WD on pavement; and the "airmatic" suspension allows the driver to raise the body by 4" if you are inclined to venture off road (whether intentional or not). The airmatic suspension allows the driver to select 3 different settings for stiffness; sport, normal, and comfort. With the airmatic suspension the owner gets, in effect, 3 different SUVs and a serious off road vehicle to boot.

Gunter and Chris had some good pointers

for all of us to keep in mind. First of all they said that internal combustion engines are approaching the theoretical maximum performance that can be obtained with the current fuel available at our neighborhood gas stations. He said they have noticed the most reliable vehicles come from customers who regularly use Chevron's premium fuel. They also warned us not to fill our tanks while the tanker trucks are filling the gas station's underground tank. The high flow rate from the tanker truck stirs up all the water and sludge from the bottom of the tank and can get sucked up and into your tank. The final piece of wisdom from Gunter and Chris to us was to always fill up at

busy gas stations, this way there is never time for water and sludge to accumulate in the gas station's tanks.

That pretty well covers what was discussed at the "Everything Cayenne" tech session. As a final farewell from Fremont Porsche, Gunter requested we all gather around the brand new 997 turbo cabriolet in the show room and have our picture taken for their next advertising campaign.

A huge thanks goes out to Gunter and Chris for sharing a snippet of their vast knowledge of the Cayenne and for providing the pizza for everyone to enjoy.



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
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
