# POST POSITIONS

I was reading the Mercury News a few days ago and saw an article about how the San Jose City Council was dealing with wages at the San Jose Airport. The council is fretting over its desire to mandate higher pay for airport workers; the so called "living wage." These wages are derived from fees charged to the airlines using the facility and the council is bumping up against the realities of economics due to the loss of airline traffic and that industry's battle for survival against their ever increasing losses from daily operation. I thought that I might try to write something, once again, about legislating social good by dictating financial mandates to industries governed by market forces. Instead, what happened was that the very next day I saw a shorter article that looked to be a follow up on the controversy but which turned out to be nothing more than a word for word reprint of parts of the previous day's story.

In my current stint as editor I am approaching sixty issues of the POST that I have been responsible for creating, so I am well versed in the notion that mistakes can be made. But it seems to me that in order for this to have been a mistake, the entire first article would have been printed. The fact that an abbreviated version of the same story appeared the next day looks to me as if the paper is struggling to fill its pages. I once read a book by a newspaperman from the 1930s who stated that one of the big chores of small town papers was getting enough news articles to justify all of the ads sold and printed in each edition. There is certainly enough news out there to fill the Merc to overflowing, but it seems likely that they haven't the funds to do so.

If you are a regular reader you certainly will have noticed that the Mercury has lost a lot of heft over the past few years. The most readily apparent loss is the want ads which have migrated to the internet. I wouldn't be surprised to hear that the paper's income from these ads is in the low single digits, percentage-wise, in comparison to earlier years.

The problem isn't local, either. I heard a radio story about how the Los Angeles Times in the 1990s aspired to be a heavyweight publication that would compete with the likes of the New York Times. Its circulation is well below half of its level in those glory days and its current owner recently acknowledged that it now intends to be no more than an advertising medium... a glorified bargain shopper.

I've seen similarly attributable deteriorations in the operation of my favorite supermarket. Empty areas on shelves where stock has run out; disorderly displays; unattended carts with cartons of product to stock the shelves sit blocking aisles with no one about; all changes that have come over this market in the last six or seven years. These alterations seem likely to be the result of cutbacks in labor for the operation of the store in its struggle to maintain profits in the face of superstore competition.

The airlines, the newspapers and the grocery stores are trying to cope with the vagaries of the marketplace and keep their businesses going. Clearly the markets are changing, the world is changing and the easy life of doing business in the world's number one economic superpower is going the way of disco. It all seems to be pointing to deteriorating quality of life in the old U.S. of A. and although it is a particular specialty of mine, I don't think that it's going to do any good to complain about it.


Third, two or three times


