Editor's Letter



#### WHEN ONLY A CARRERA WILL DO

I'm leaving the Annual Awards Banquet with the Newcomer of the Year plaque and the job as Editor of the Prieta Post beginning now. My thought is, how did this happen? Giving it some thought I suppose it's best to start from the beginning so you know how I got here.

The beginning needs to describe the desire for the car. It was really an impulse. I really went through phases of liking Porsches but never thinking I'd ever own one except for a couple of times previously, once overcome by the stronger desire for an American muscle-car in the 70's and once when the "for the price it's a better deal" was the logical thought for the purchase of a Corvette in the mid-80's. I was one of those people who grew up thinking most of the time that a Porsche was just a Volkswagen with lock-washers.

In early 2002 it was time to buy a real car... a middle-age crisis cool dad car, after owning and driving a wagon, a couple of SUV's and even a van. I drove the F-1 paddle shifting red Ferrari Modena 360 in the family and I thought I had to have something like this, but the Ferrari was a bit over the top. Not really something I would feel comfortable driving around daily. I wanted something that had the performance but not with the extravagance or the price. I had a BMW before and thought something German was more my style, more Teutonic as they say.

The first stop for the cool car was to look at the drop-top Benz, you know, the midsize ubiquitous model that most people buy. After looking at the car I was told by the salesperson that the model was at the end of its run and was being redesigned for the next year, that won't due, I didn't want a car that would look old in only one year. Off to the next and it was to the BMW dealer to see what they had, the M3 convertible in the showroom was black and looked good, but Jackie saw outside at the end of the used car row a 911. I remember she said, "That's what you should really get." We took a look at the used car briefly and then off to the Porsche dealer across the street. I really had no idea what models Porsche had or anything about the mechanicals

When the salesperson at Stevens Creek Porsche greeted us I just said, "I want a Turbo." The response after looking at this family that just showed up in a mini-van was, "Man, that's a lot of power, we don't have any to show you because you have to order a Turbo or a 4S which is the wide-body model without the turbo motor." Anyway, I had the learning experience. I had no idea what type of engine a 911 had but I understood the models and was asked if I wanted to bid on a GT2 that was on their showroom floor at the time with a \$250K price tag. I figured if I was going that direction, I would just go for the Ferrari. Anyway, I liked the all black Carrera with the Advanced Techtronic package and the Aluminum shifter and handbrake. It looked great with the black interior. What I liked about the GT2 was the color, Arctic Silver. We took the sales brochure and left with the knowledge that if we wanted the Turbo or 4S it would take six months or they would give us a bit of a deal on the cars in stock. The salesperson said, "you know, you'll join the Porsche club and then you'll see all the options you can get and you really should get it exactly the way you want it." That was the first discussion of the Porsche club.

After carefully looking at the sales literature, I figured the Carrera 4S was the thinking-man's Porsche. It had the wide-body looks of the Turbo at a \$35K discount. With regard to the performance, 0-60 was about one second slower, and I know that you can feel that in the seat of your pants, but it wasn't practical to me to get to 60 one second faster. So the practical



side said, I want the 4S. That was the easy part. The salesperson said to go on the website and pick the options and just fax the list. Options are confusing and obviously this is big business for Porsche. You pay big money for all this stuff. I knew I had to have the Bose, the Advanced Techtronic Package, Navigation, and the most popular option Porsche sells; the white gauges that came in a package with my favorite Aluminum shifter and handbrake. I'm convinced that I'm like a Magpie, I'm attracted to shiny objects. The website allows you to see the options on the cars in stock

at the dealership. This was a big help in deciding the configuration, I could key in on what was popular and how to build the car. Anyway I figured out what I wanted, Arctic Silver and black interior, I faxed the details and my selected options and then sent a check to place an order. I put the picture on the refrigerator and settled in for my six-month wait. It was actually only five months.

With delivery came the explanation of the owner's manual and then the statement, "here is the application to PCA, you will probably want to join." The next thing was signing the contract and realizing, I'm buying an expensive car that I've never even driven. My salesperson said, "that's how it is." So, I got my car with that odometer at 27 miles, the coveted number showing you got it with delivery miles.

Fast forward, I joined PCA and they threw me into GGR. I suppose because they didn't know where my Zip Code was and didn't know that Loma Prieta was closer to Gilroy than San Mateo. Rallye Chairman's Letter



Welcome to Checkpoint. This is a new series appearing in the LPR Post beginning this month, designed to enlighten our membership about car rallyes. As your new Rallye Chairman I will be coordinating a series of events for 2009 that will give you an opportunity to test your skills as well as your luck in these fun driving events.

Presently we have 3 rallye events planned for 2009. Time permitting we will endeavor to add a few more.

Saturday, June 6th A Navigational/Gimmick style rallye:

Rallyemaster: Bob Frostholm

Saturday, August 22nd A Navigational/Gimmick style rallye:

Rallyemasters: John Reed & Paul Smith

Saturday, October 24th Style TBD:

Rallyemaster: Bob Frostholm

The term "rallye", as a branch of motorsport, dates from the first Monte Carlo Rally of January 1907. Until the late 1920s, few if any other events used the term. Rallying itself can be traced back to the 1894 Paris-Rouen Horseless Carriage Competition (Concours des Voitures sans Chevaux), sponsored by a Paris newspaper, Le Petit Journal, which attracted considerable public interest and entries from leading manufacturers. This event led directly to a period of city-to-city road races in France and other European countries, which introduced many of the features found in later rallies: individual start times with cars running against the clock rather than head to head; time controls at the entry and exit points of towns along the way; road books and route notes; and driving over long distances on ordinary, mainly gravel, roads, facing hazards such as dust,

traffic, pedestrians and farm animals. When you hear the term rallye, you probably think of scenes like this one:

...super modified Subarus, Audis, Lancias, Peugeots etc. ripping through unchartered lands, racing at breakneck speed from one point to another. That's not quite what we have in mind here at LPR. In fact, just the opposite.

Road rallying can best described as a board game on wheels. Just like in a board game, you get a set of rules, when you first register for the event. These rules govern the actual play of the event. So if you like Monopoly, Scrabble, Tripoly, Trivial Pursuit, Wheel of Fortune, or Jeopardy, or even poker you'll love rallying (yes, there are poker rallyes).

It is NOT a race or speed event, but instead is a skill-based sport that bases your knowledge of the rules against your ability to apply those rules out on short rallye courses. These are fun events for singles, couples, and yes, even couples with children and - well, just about anyone that enjoys a fun time and true challenge. Most of our rallyes will involve sign spotting so the more eyes to help you the better you may score. For a first hand view of the rallye experience checkout this website: http://www.speakeasy.org/~swatt/babr-l.wmv

Rallyes come in all shapes and sizes. During the next several months I will use this column to introduce you to the type of rallying we will do this year and some of their variations to give you a taste of what you can expect on our events. Who knows, there might even be a clue embedded in one of these articles so pay attention and keep your copies of The Post.

Here is a brief description of many of the varieties or rallyes available:

#### A Point-to-Point Rallye

You choose your own course, rather than following ours. Instead of Route Instructions, we will give you a list of questions and a map with spots marked on it. One question can be answered at each spot on the map. Of course to make it more interesting there will be too many to visit them all in the 3 hours you're given, so it's up to you to develop a strategy for visiting as many as you can, in whatever order you decide. Those farther away will likely have higher points assigned to the answers. Guessing at answers is dangerous, because wrong answers count more against you than blanks. Coming in late triggers heavy penalties. Since speed and driving skill do figure heavily into your success, this comes closer to being a "race" than any other rallye. But, like all our events, breaking the law will get you disqualified.

#### Navigational/Gimmick Rallye

The dictionary defines "gimmick" as a device employed to deceive or trick, to clutter with catchy details. A Navigational/Gimmick rallye is simply one put together by the Rallyemaster that is full of catchy details, deceptions, puzzles, and tricks. It is up to you to generally decode and figure out the various gimmicks in a particular rallye. These gimmicks will include tricky wordings, and definitions that are easily misinterpreted. In a typical rallye, entrants are given a packet of various types of instructions which contain some puzzles and clues (some obvious, some not) to solve. These puzzles are the "gimmicks" of the rallye. Materials given to you at the start are to be taken literally. As you follow the set of instructions appropriately named "Route Instructions", you will solve these

clues and deviate from the route from time to time, since the correct solution of a puzzle may direct you momentarily away from the route. The "turkey route" is the route outlined in the Route Instructions, which, if followed religiously, would get you from Start to Finish. If you have correctly deduced the gimmick, you will be temporarily re-routed in a way that you can accumulate points on your score sheet.

#### A / B Rallye

The A/B Rallye is very similar to the Navigational/Gimmick Rallye. Each route instruction will have two parts, A and B. Following the rules of the game you will have to select which part is correct and follow that instruction. Of course these instructions will be laced with gimmicks designed to trick you. Scoring is based almost exclusively on which part of a route instruction you execute, part A or part B.

#### Hare and Hound (or Fox and Hound) Rallye

You are the hound and it is your task to follow your prey from the start to the finish. The only clues you will get to indicate that you are on the right course will be when you locate the preys "droppings". To be environmentally friendly, the droppings will consist of markings on the road, generally mounds of flour or lime, within a quarter mile of each intersection. You are given a starting point and a destination. You follow the route by finding "droppings" at intersections. If a mound is found, then you are on the correct course. A working odometer is needed as the mileage clocked during the event that is closest to that of the rallyemaster wins.

#### Q-A (Question and Answer) Rallyes

Various Questions are interspersed among the Route Instructions. At the appropriate points in the rallye, you record your Answers on the score sheet. This is a very low key, sightseeing event, where you will enjoy the drive while keeping your eyes peeled for answers

#### T&D (Time and Distance, TSD, Time-Speed-Distance) Rallyes

You follow Route Instructions that direct you on a course at assigned speeds. You are timed when you arrive at checkpoints, which are usually at undisclosed locations. The correct time of arrival is based on the distance traveled and the speeds assigned. Upon arrival at a checkpoint, you are assigned an out time, the time at which you are to start the next leg.

If you have previous rallye experience and would be interested in writing and






recipients and, of course, I made all of this up and Ed is in the clear.


