

letter from the Editor



My opinion is that Bob is taking the club to a new level of involvement with the addition of rallying. We are going beyond only autocross, tours, GTG's and drinking. 

letter from the Rallye Chairman

Way too many 'Ways'... or... how to learn to love confusion

Welcome once again to Checkpoint. This is the third in our new series of articles discussing the



sport of car rallying. During the next few months we'll expose you to some of the joys of rallying and hope that you will join us on one or more of the fun events planned for 2009. I hope you enjoyed the practice rallye from last months POST. Some feedback was that it was too difficult for beginners so I've tried to make this one easier. I've had a couple of emails regarding the picture... Yes, this is what I look like today...living proof that rallying makes you younger...now if that doesn't get you off the sofa and on the road for our real events, well, then, I guess nothing will.

Just another reminder... we have 3 rallye events scheduled for 2009. Time permitting we will endeavor to add a few more.

Saturday, June 6th A Navigational/Gimmick style rallye

Rallyemaster: Bob Frostholm

Saturday, August 22nd A Navigational/Gimmick style rallye

Rallyemasters: John Reed & Paul Smith

Saturday, October 24th Style TBD: Rallyemaster: Bob Frostholm

Since our first two scheduled events are Navigational/Gimmick style rallyes, and likely the third will be also, let's take a few moments and focus on just what that means. In case you missed last month's article, let's review what a Navigational/Gimmick Rallye really is? In one word, it's a game. I guess that's really three and a half words. Think of the game Monopoly by Parker Brothers. In a rallye, you are the player, your car is the token and the open road is the board upon which the game is played. In a Navigational/Gimmick Rallye you are competing on the open road. Remember, it is not a race. In many cases we give you at least two ways to leave an intersection. Just as in a computer logic game where there is only one correct way to leave a room, there is only one correct way to complete each Route Instruction in the rallye. One important note...

and those who tried last month's table top rallye may have concluded, a rallye is won or lost before you leave the start. It is very important to read and re-read the instructions carefully. You'll catch many of the gimmicks (traps) before you hit the road.

Are you ready to have some fun? Here's another practice rallye for you to try. This one is easier and a bit different. On this rallye you will always have two route instructions in effect at the same time. This is called an A/B rallye. Each instruction will have two choices, A or B. You will have to decide which of the two is a better choice. Sometimes it will be obvious, but once again it is our duty to try to trick you and therefore many of these will rely on your deductive reasoning skills to select the best route. Scoring will be based primarily on which choice you make so study the situation carefully and make the right choices.

"Way too many 'Ways'... or... how to learn to love confusion" General Instructions:

Welcome to the Rallye. Feedback from last month's puzzle was that it was too difficult so I have tried to make this one easier. If you think carefully about each instruction you won't find anything hard about this rallye. Start at the corner of the map where it says "start" and follow the route instructions below. Scoring will be determined by how well you understood and followed the instructions. This is an A / B rallye, meaning each numbered route instruction has two ways to complete the instruction, an A and a B. Your challenge is to always take the right way and always avoid the wrong way. On your Score sheet simply circle the choice you made for each instruction. Hint, it may be easier to print the page (if you're reading this online) so you can read the route instructions while looking at the map—but don't peek at the answers (provided later in this issue), you won't learn anything that way.

Perform the route instructions in descending order at the first chance to do so. Stay as straight as possible when you do not have a route instruction to execute. Use the definitions and rules as your guide. Assume no prior knowledge for this route. Do not drive on road segments that would take you off of the map. For the first part of this event we want you to keep close track of your route. Do not drive on the same portion of a road in the same direction more than once. However, you may cross a road you have travelled on and you may go in the opposite direction over a segment you have already driven on. In the RI there will be a notation to tell you

when this rule is no longer in effect. All valid roads used will be paved. No dirt, gravel, sand etc. roads will be used.

Order of precedence

- 1. California Motor Vehicle Code. (don't break the law)
- 2. Instructions from Rallyemaster or Checkpoint Personnel
- 3. Bonus
- 4. General Instructions (GI)
- 5. Notes
- 6. Route Instructions (RI)

DEFINITIONS & CONCEPTS

R - turn right

L - turn left

Bear – used with R or L to indicate a turn of less than 90 degrees

T – an intersection that is shaped like the capital letter T when approached up the stem. Turn right at all otherwise uninstructed T intersections.

At – as close to as possible. All words, numbers and letters following "At" must appear on the sign with the exception of Signal, Stop, Yield, …these words do not have to appear on a sign. Execute the instruction at their physical location.

Sign – a generally flat surface with letters and or numbers on it, used to guide you along the route. Do not look behind you to see signs, but you may have to look sideways (90 degrees) from your direction of travel.

Street naming sign − ♠ - A sign that designates the name of the street with which it is parallel

Forced Turn - A situation where the road turns and you have no alternative but to follow the turn.

Onto – puts you onto a road by name, so after you go 'R onto Los Palmos', the only way you can exit this road is by an instruction that names another road. You do 'R at Sorrento' and then you can do an instruction like 'R 1st Chance' that does not name a road. When an instruction puts you onto a road, you can not leave that road with an instruction using a term such as chance, or signal or stop so, if the road ends and there is no instruction for you to complete, you must make a U turn and remain "onto" the road until you can execute an instruction.

. Checkpoint.

Notes – these are instructions that appear on the route instruction page. They come into effect when a part of the route instruction (A or B) immediately preceding them has been completed. They remain in effect until cancelled by another note or until completed. You may execute route instructions while looking for notes and visa versa.

Intersection – Where two or more roads meet or connect

Hard – used with R or L to indicate a turn of more than 90 degrees

Turn – Turn in the only possible direction

Chance - an opportunity to turn at an intersection off of the road you are on at valid road


Signal – a multicolored traffic control device

Yield - a multicolored traffic control device

Stop – a multicolored traffic control device

Additional Comments; Rallying is a fun sport, so cast away anything negative, put on some mood music, pour yourself a favorite beverage in order to ensure you use a positive way to enjoy an evening of rallying. Also please note that often in a rallye, it is necessary to delete certain gimmicks so they don't continue to repeat themselves throughout the event...so the exception to the order of precedence stated above is that a Note can instruct you to delete a gimmick (meaning we will not trick you like that again).

Okay, begin and have fun... Cheers, Bob







With visions of seven chilies, salads, cornbread, desserts and Emilie Highley on a nude beach dancing in their heads, the fifty



Joe's Got It Down.

That's right. Joe Silva of Custom Alignment in Mountain View has definitely got it down...the rubber down on the road that is!

Saturday morning, January 31 - Joe not only put on an extremely informative technical session on tires, alignment, and Porsche 911 suspensions, he also hosted an impressive mini car show.


By 10am, about 30 of us had gathered in front of Custom Alignment in our Porsches of all vintages. The shop doors opened revealing several nicely detailed cars including: 356, '68 912 Targa, 914-8, GT3, GT3RS.



After a while of checking out the cars, snacking on doughnuts and drinking coffee, Joe started the session talking about tire mounting. The Hunter Auto 34 is very gentle on rims and has so much automation, it practically does the entire job itself, no human required. The Hunter GSP 9700 balancing machine has all the bells and whistles: loaded balancing, centering, straight track.

Custom Alignment does not stock tires. They work together with Tire Rack to provide the customer with a one stop solution. Custom Alignment is one of Tire Rack's top rated installers.

Moving on to the alignment systems. Custom Alignment uses the Hunter DSP600 and its predecessor, the John Beam system. We then talked about more suspension tuning. For perfect corner balancing, it is necessary to adjust with the driver in the



driver's seat. At Custom Alignment, the driver's weight is simulated with weights. Since some people are "sensitive" to divulging their weight, Joe has come up with a more gentle way of finding how much weight to put in the driver's seat. Instead of "How much do you weigh", the question to the client is "How much weight do you want in the driver's seat?" This way everyone stays happy!




Custom Alignment had Tony Vanacore's '68 912 Targa up on the rack to replace the tie rods. The original tie rods used a rubber yoke bushing. The new tie rods being installed are a mono-ball style (turbo tie rods). Elephant Racing makes a turbo style (monoball) tie rod that fits the

short wheel base '68 912. These tie rods are stronger and have less play than the originals.

Chuck from Elephant Racing was present to answer questions about the tie rods and several other Elephant Racing products including: Adjustable Spring Plates, Offset Ball Joints, and Camber Plates.




Tony Vanacore braved the early morning chill in his Boxter
