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



Potential POST Technical Writer shares secrets of complex Porsche repair

Hey Steve,

I'm too late for the April 1st issue of this excellent newsletter, but here's one or two interesting technical tips that Porsche nuts may like to consider:

Tech Tips:

1. Valve adjustment made easy, pleasant and fun.

Next time you do your own valve adjustment, try this procedure. Buy yourself a six pack can of Miller draft. Drive into a nice country area, and park the car under a shady tree and relax in the shade. Open your six pack, and drink all six cans at your leisure. By the time time you have done this the car will have cooled enough to the correct temperature to adjust your valves. Take scissors or tin snips, and from one of the empty cans cut lengthwise a straight 1/2" wide strip of metal. The can is made of exactly the correct thickness as a feeler blade for your valve adjustment. Bend the last 3/4" at a 15 degree angle, and now as an improvised valve adjustment tool go ahead and adjust your valves.

2. Engine overhaul without a floor jack.

The side jack that comes with the car's tool kit can only be used to raise the car's wheels off the ground, and unlike a commercial floor jack cannot be used to lower the engine for removal. However, if the car is raised high enough with suitable blocks or bricks as shims, the car can be raised high enough to allow the engine to be lowered and removed. To do this without a floor jack, purchase a large solid block ice from a fish market or similar vendor, and place it on the floor under the middle of the engine. Having disconnected the half-shafts, gear shift rod, hoses, wires, etc., slowly loosen the engine mounts and gradually lower the car onto the block of ice. Have patience, and as the ice melts the engine will gradually be lowered to the ground. Simply reverse the procedure to re-install the engine.

3. Improve your brakes. (Drilled rotors only)

This takes a little time, but it is guaranteed to provide stopping power like you've never known before.

Remove the drilled brake rotors, and use them as drill jigs to exactly transfer the hole positions to the brake pads. Drill the pads, and press-fit short cylindrical pegs of steel in them. Make sure the lengths of the protruding pegs in the pads are short enough to still allow the rotors to still run freely after re-assembling the brakes, but long enough to enter the corresponding holes in the rotors when operating the brake pedal.



letter from the Rallye Chairman

Welcome once again to Checkpoint. Our first live event, "Santa Cruzin' for Cash" is fast approaching...be sure to reserve June 6th for a fun day. Weather should be close to perfect this time of year. I've had several people approach me and say that their kids wanted to do the rallye too. It will be interesting to see the family rivalry this might create.



In our last issue I promised another table top rallye for practice, but I've been getting my keyboard slapped for hogging too many pages in the POST. So this month I'll tone it way down and just address a few key points that just might help you on the 6th.

- 1. Pay attention to chance and op. One of these terms will be used to put you "onto" a road by name and as such your next valid instruction must name a road...it cannot be something like: L at T or L 3rd chance or L at signal... It will need to be something like R at Lincoln;
- 2. Check the spelling on signs compared to your instructions;
- 3. Knowledge of US Currency will help you with one of the bonus tasks on the 6th; and
- 4. Pay attention when counting chances or opps...some of those roads may not be real chances or opps to turn and should not be counted (see below).

Try these General Instruction definitions: T: an intersection shaped like the capital Letter T. At: as close to as possible but not before. L: a turn to the left


If the RI said L at T...You turn left at A Street. It is a T...(if the GI had said T: an intersection shaped like the capital letter T when you approach it up the stem, then you would turn at M street)

If the RI said L at 2nd T...You turn L at C street

If the RI said L at 3rd T...You turn left at C Street (A,B and C Streets are all Ts, ... C is the third T)

If the RI said , L at 4th T... You turn L at E street ("as close to as possible but not before" the 4th T)

If the Definition had said L: a chance to turn in the direction indicated, and the RI said L at 3rd T, then you would turn at G street (your third chance to do an L at T, whereas in the earlier example you turn left when you have seen your 3rd T)



Now try this... In the General Instructions there is a sentence that says, 'Rallyes are a competition among peers, like school, so try to avoid any F's in this class.' This is one of those implied hints we slip into the instructions...Avoid the Fs...

If the RI said R 1st Chance...You turn on B Street...no gimmick

If the RI said R 5th Chance... you turn on J Street because you don't count F Street as a hance...GI said to avoid any Fs

RI numbers... be sure to look for tricks here... we might do something that looks like an innocent typo and really, it's a trick...

- L at T
 R at Stop
 R at Mitchell....
 L at Signal
- 14. L at Jackie

(Looks like we just had some dyslexia with RI 12...check twice... there may be a RI number 12 hidden elsewhere in the route instructions)

Speaking of RI... don't be intimidated by the number of instructions, especially in an A/B rallye like the one on June 6th...When we create a trap, some cars will catch it and others won't... so some will select A and others B... Now we need to get everyone back together again and that may take 3 or 4 or maybe more RI to generate the two loops and then get them to converge.

I hope to see all of you on the 6th of June for "Cruzin' For Cash".... Oh, yes, 1st place prize in each class is Cash.


