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
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Editor's Letter


Our work detail put us at station three, which was smack in the middle of a very large radius in the center of the track. I eagerly awaited his comments as

Holbrooke Tour

Il I can say is you don't want to miss a tour directed by Don and Leslie Orlando. And this tour was no different. Somehow, the Orlandos took us through nine counties and over seven drawbridges crossing three rivers. There was a 40-degree temperature range, one buffalo, three escaped horses and the third tallest bridge in the country. Told you....don't miss an Orlando tour.

Twenty-one cars (116 total cylinders) with their drivers and passengers, met in the cool early morning in Milpitas. As always, the cadre of Porsches was quite the talk inside the near-by Starbucks. Tour hosts Don and Leslie gathered the troops for the drivers' meeting giving us a briefing of our day, our driving instructions and a goodie bag of snacks. As is the LPR way, we left promptly at 8:30. After a quick jaunt on Highway 680 we ventured into Livermore where wineries and bicyclists were plentiful. Then we headed toward a favorite road for Porsche drivers (not always passengers) Patterson Pass Road.

Patterson Pass Road is a narrow, twisting and beautiful road that rewards the driver with thrills and gives the passenger spectacular views of the San Joaquin Valley and the Altamont Wind Farm, the oldest wind farm in the U.S. The sight of more than 4900 wind turbines (which, by the way, turn clockwise) against the brown rolling hills and the miles of winding road ahead is an amazing sight.

The story has it that Patterson Pass was named for the wife of Andrew Jackson Patterson who settled in the area in the 1850s. One day, while driving through the pass, the Patterson's wagon (no Porsches back then) was overturned by the frequent strong winds and Mrs. Patterson suffered a broken leg. Patterson Pass also boasts two of three legendary haunted locations in Livermore...Gravity Hill and the Hanging Tree.



On the other side of Patterson Pass our cool morning temperature rose from 60 to 75 degrees. The country back roads were scattered with small vineyards and horse stables and all were enjoying the beautiful scenery and casual pace when Don slowed the group to a crawl. In front of his car were three gorgeous and agitated horses. The three were weaving across the roadway, almost as if they were the CHP creating a traffic break.



The horses would move to one side and Don would inch forward and



they would move back in front of him. Finally the three spotted their horse friends in another ranch and left the road. However, everyone passed with care. The 1 horsepower stallions dwarfed our own low-slung multi-hundred horsepower rides and those of us with the top down felt a bit vulnerable.

The next portion our trip took us was along the delta waterways and over numerous drawbridges as we made our way toward Sacramento, the City of Trees. Oddly enough, this is where we saw a Buffalo. Our lunch spot was the ever-favorite Crawdad's Cantina on the Sacramento River. Crawdad's actually floats on the river making it a great place to watch the weekend boating activity. With fantastic food and a comfortable outdoor setting, the group recharged for the rest of the day.

Our afternoon route took us through the towns of Cool and Coloma toward the Foresthill Bridge. From Highway 49 you get a clear view of the bridge and its incredible height. The Foresthill Bridge is the third highest in the country and the tallest in California rising 730 feet above the bed of the American River. It was constructed in the early 70s and was built from each end, eventually meeting in the middle. The bridge can be seen in the action movie "xXx" in which Vin Diesel's character drives a Corvette off it, jumping out mid-flight to parachute safely to the river bed. Makes our Porsche adventures look pretty tame! The road then brought us up the hill to drive over the bridge. Unfortunately (unless you hate bridges) from the car you can't see much but a number of pedestrians were walking across and their views must have been spectacular!



Our next stop was the Taylor family's Mt. Vernon Winery in Auburn, the largest and most award -winning in Placer County. In fact, their 2005 Girly Man (Petite Syrah blend) has won five gold medals. Our group tasted the Taylor's white wines under a beautiful arbor in front of the wine maker's home, while the reds were sampled in the tasting room, an old converted milk house built in the 1950s. Porches lined the circular driveway and the LPR bunch was content sipping great wines and meandering about the property, finding bits of shade to escape the 96-degree heat. A very ecologically conscious winery, the Taylors have worked with UC Davis researchers using specially trained sheep that only eat the grass and weeds in the



vineyards and not the grapevines, eliminating the need for herbicides.

The last leg of our journey took us on beautiful back roads to our final destination, the Holbrooke Hotel in Grass Valley. Built in 1862, the hotel has hosted four U.S. Presidents (Grant, Cleveland, Harrison & Garfield) as well as Mark Twain. All of their signatures are still visible in the hotels quest register. Holbrooke's Golden Gate Saloon is reputedly the oldest continually operating saloon west of the Mississippi. However, the hotel offers all the modern amenities so appreciated by us all, along with the charm of a bygone era. As is tradition, the group gathered on the second floor veranda for a "good times gathering" before heading down to the outdoor patio for a fabulous dinner.

Thanks to the Orlandos for planning a great tour with the attention to detail that made us all feel like special guests!


First Tour? Look Like a Pro the First Time Out!

Taking your first tour can bring you back to the days of being the new kid in class. Here are some tips from LPR veterans to help you look like a pro the first time out.

- Prep your car. That means a FULL tank of gas and of course a nice wash & shine!
- Arrive early to meet your new best friends, fill out paperwork and attend the drivers' meeting. LPR tours run on time so don't be late!
- Make a personal pit stop before beginning the tour. It's morning, there's coffee and...well, you can figure that one out!
- Bring a walkie-talkie or hand held CB radio. You won't want to miss the conversations and commentary.
 They're also used to let drivers know about any road hazards, upcoming turns or to alert the group if someone has a problem or question.

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News from Porsche

Porsche 911 GT3 Cup to Makes its Debut at Pikes Peak Hillclimb; Six-Time Champion Jeff Zwart Takes Purpose-built Race Car to the "Hill" For the First Time

Colorado Springs - June 21, 2010 - For the first time since Porsche began production of the 911 GT3 Cup race car in 1989, the car will contest a major international hillclimb including more than five miles of gravel.

Jeff Zwart, a commercial film director from Woody Creek Colorado, and six-time class winner at the Pikes Peak Hillclimb, will challenge the 2WD Time Attack class with his specially-prepared Luminox watch Porsche 911 GT3 Cup race car.

With technical support from Porsche Motorsport North America (PMNA) and Pirelli Tires, Zwart will be contesting the 88th running of the hillclimb classic, the second oldest race in America (behind the Indy 500). Zwart said that running a 2WD, normally aspirated, purpose-built race car up the "Mountain" will be a new experience for him despite his nine starts at Pikes Peak.

"In previous years, I have always taken a street Porsche Turbo and converted it into a race car, but this time, with the help of Porsche and Pirelli, we have taken a race car and modified it for Pikes Peak unique half tarmac-half gravel course. I practiced in the car last week, and was very surprised at the balance, power, and braking the car provided. The low-ratio sequential gear box keeps me busy through the 156 turns, but it makes the car very quick," said Zwart.

Porsche Motorsport started with a 2007 Cup car, updated it to 2010 specifications, and installed a new 450 horsepower 3.8-liter engine currently in use in the Patron GT3 Challenge, American Le Mans Series Challenge Class, and the Porsche Supercup series. The engine management mapping was modified to perform well in high altitude as the race starts at 9,390 feet and finishes at the summit, 14,110 feet above sea level, and ride height was increased for the gravel sections of the course. The underbody was also modified to protect the car from gravel and stones similar to rally competition.

Pirelli has provided road racing-style rain tires which worked very well both on paved and gravel surfaces during last week's test.

"This event should show the real versatility of our Cup racer," said Paul Ritchie, president of Porsche Motorsport North America, Inc.

"With the variety of surfaces and altitude changes, the car was a handful to set up, but, between our PMNA engineers, Porsche Motorsport engineering consultant Roland Kussmaul - a rally veteran - and great help from Pirelli, we think we have given Jeff a car which will provide his best chance for a win," said Ritchie. "I can slide the car across the dirt and grab gears without even lifting," Zwart added. "Add to that the car's behavior on the tarmac - the surface for which the car was built, and we should have a great chance to win."

Zwart has won his class at Pikes Peak - all in Porsche Turbo street cars - in 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, 1998, and 2002, setting new class records three times. Most recently, he co-drove a Porsche Cayenne with Pikes Peak veteran Paul Dallenbach at the challenging TransSyberia Rally (Moscow to Mongolia) in 2007. He also has an SCCA PRO Rally Championship (1990) and a SCORE Baja 1000 class win (2004) to his credit.

The Porsche 911 GT3 Cup car, built on the same assembly line in Stuttgart as the street-legal Porsche 911s, is raced all over the world in the Porsche Supercup series as well as various Porsche Carrera Cup and Challenge Cups. New last year was the additional of the American Le Mans Series Challenge class, where the Porsche Cup cars contest the full endurance series run by the Le Mans racers.

The Porsche will run the middle part of the course during Thursday practice, and the top part of the course on Friday. Friday is also Fan Fest in Colorado Springs, and the race Sunday begins at 9:00 AM MDT. Results will be posted on the official Pikes Peak web site - www.ppihc.com.
