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PRESIDENT'S LETTER

TOURS AND TOUR PROTOCOL

If you have not been on a tour or just want to find out what is involved in participating in a tour, I will try to explain.

Tours are planned for the entire following year at the November Planning Meeting. The Prieta Post prints during the year each upcoming tour with tour name, tour dates and who to contact to sign up for the tour. These notices occur usually at least two months prior to the tour date. The tour coordinator will notify everyone who has signed up where and when to meet for the start of a tour prior to the tour date. On the day of the tour there will be a Drivers' Meeting where route instructions are handed out, any special information will be provided and to sign the PCA release form. Sometimes, these meeting locations are at restaurants where participants can meet for breakfast before the Drivers' Meeting.

It is recommended that the tour participants have a CB radio to keep in communications with other cars. The CB radio is also a great social media as much conversation and humorous comments occur during the tour. Without a CB radio, it is like going to a movie without any sound. The CB radio also allows warnings of any road hazards for following cars. If the group gets separated, and it always seems to happen, the radio makes it possible to inform the tour leader to slow down or even pull to the side of the road for the



remaining group to catch up. We are always thinking safety when on tours, and we do not want to put anyone in an awkward position. Most tours end at a specific destination. It is at this point everyone is then on their own to continue to visit the last destination, explore other points of interest or just head home.

Even though tours are wrapping up for this year, we have to remind those who participate in our tours some of the protocols required.

The first and most important is to contact the tour coordinator in advance to be placed on the list of participants. Most tours have a limited number of cars that can be on the tour due to restaurant limited seating or limited hotel accommodations. Also, pre-payment of fees are required for most tours to complete reservations. The coordinator of the tour has many things to complete to have a successful tour, and any breakdown of communications will only cause stress and problems. If protocol is not followed, there can be major issues on the tour. No one can just show up and expect to be allowed to participate on the tour.

Secondly, if a tour participant wishes to bring an animal, the tour coordinator must give permission to do so. The tour coordinator will be responsible to verify if animals are allowed at the tour stops and accommodations for overnight tours. The tour coordinator will obtain written verification from the hotel of what the animal limitations are and what the deposit for the animal will be. If animals are not allowed at

Once such a reservation is made, the tour coordinator must be notified of the arrangements.

HOW CLEAN IS A "CLEAN" CAR? A First Time Concours Entrant's Tale

have often admired those who concours their cars. The amount of hard work and attention to detail required to prepare their Porsche to go under the microscope. To allow a team of judges to scrutinize every last inch and, heaven forbid, any wayward specks of dust or dirt one may have missed. Everyone jokes about cleaning the nooks and crannies with Q-tips. In fact, bundles of Q-tips were the centerpieces at the Concours Banquet of the first Porsche Parade I attended. I took one look at those little bundles and thought, "I am NEVER going to enter a Concours!"



As it turned out "never" only lasted thirteen years. As some of you may know, I recently acquired a white 1988 944 with burgundy and black interior. For a 25 year old car, it was in remarkable condition. It needed a few repairs and replacements, but all in all it was almost like new. The main sentiment upon viewing the car from

most everyone who saw it was, "Wow, it's so clean!" Somehow that simple four word statement repeated over and over, lead my dad to the bright idea for me to enter the LPR Zone 7 Concours at PartsHeaven. For some odd reason, and I still can't pinpoint when or how it happened, I agreed to enter in the "Wash and Shine" class (in which the exterior and interior are judged). Once, we got started however, we decided to be a little more ambitious and enter in Street class (where the engine is also judged). After the umpteenth trip to PartsHeaven, we decided to enter in Restoration class, as my car was old enough and we had done a lot to bring my car back to factory.

Now, you recall the mantra that lead to this decision...well, you have no idea how dirty a "clean" car is, until you prep it for a Concours. In the beginning, I was at a complete loss as to where to start. I knew the basics and we had a pretty extensive collection of car care products, but the task seemed insurmountable. Enter Les Schreiber with, what I dubbed, the "Concours Bible". Actually, the Zone 7 Concours Guide. I don't think I could have done it without this guide. It has lists of products, tips on areas judges look for dirt and even an area-by-area, step-bystep cleaning guide. With the "Bible" in hand, a game plan started to form and it didn't seem so daunting.

After purchasing the proper products, applicators, and multiple Costco-sized containers of Q-Tips, cleaning began. At first, it seemed simple enough: use this product for this part, clean that with this cloth, use a little elbow grease to get a particularly difficult spot clean. Then, the areas got smaller, so out came the headlamps and the Q-Tips...and more Q-Tips...and then "oh, no the spot I'm cleaning now, just got the spot I finished cleaning dirty!" Still more Q-Tips, until that little crevice is too small for a Q-Tip and out come the microbrushes. Yes, I said microbrushes! Now that area is too far to reach, so let's tape this brush to a stick. A little more



elbow grease, some perseverance and finally, a coat of polish or protectant. I found myself spending 3 or 4 hours on just one little section or part. At times, I even asked, "Why are we doing this?" But, I began to get the hang of it and kind of started to enjoy it. With my dad by my side, little by little and inch by inch we cleaned, scrubbed, brushed and polished the whole car. Except for underneath, I had to draw the line somewhere.

When all was said and done, we drove to PartsHeaven for the Zone 7 Concours. We settled in, filled out the paperwork and put the finishing touches on the car. By finishing touches, I mean a full wipe down of the exterior (don't forget the brake dust on the rims) and vacuum of the interior. Then, the call for "light dusting" is made and soon after judging com-

mences. So, the last 15 weeks came down to less than 10 minutes. My car was the first to be judged. They asked if I had my PCA Membership card and a fire extinguisher. I had both, so free points for me! Then, the head judge did a walk around inspection of the exterior. I was then asked to open the doors, trunk, hood and interior compartments so the other judges could, well, judge. When judging was complete, they showed me each of the areas they deducted points and the reason why. They also gave a few pointers on what to do next time. So, how did I do? We were hoping for a score of at least 200 out of a possible 250. It wasn't that I didn't think we did a good job, just that it was my first concours and I had no clue what to expect. I have to say, I never expected to get 243 out of 250! Yes, that was my final score and I couldn't have been prouder. Suddenly,



all those hours spent bent over a single part, cleaning with a microbrush, seemed worth it.

So, my advice for any first timers who would like to concours: Go for it! Start with the Zone 7 Concours Guide, get the right tools and products for each part of the car (all listed in the "Concours Bible") and above all, HAVE FUN! I look back on this experience as hard work but also a lot of fun. I got a great story out of it, too. When asked if I would do it again? I can't say for certain, but I do know I am glad I did it. I got to know my car inside and out. And, now, I do have a CLEAN car!

I got an e-mail from the online magazine Winding Road, offering slogan tee shirts, and all they had were "Keep calm and carry speed" and "It's surprising how many people, including Formula 1 drivers, think the brakes are for slowing the car down, " which is attributed to Mario Andretti.

Not exactly inspiring, are they?

Which is very ironic, because if you're a runner you get inundated with all manner of profundities. One magazine, Runner's World, actually sends you a "Daily Kick in the Butt" by e-mail.

And it's even more ironic, because many of the lines I see relate to a lot more than running... like competing in general... and like life.

Take "A man can fall many times, but he isn't a failure until he begins to blame somebody else," attributed to Steve Prefontaine. And another one from Pre, "To give anything less than your best is to sacrifice the gift."

And here's my favorite from Steve, "A lot of people run a race to see who's the fastest. I run to see who has the most guts...."

In point of fact, the running world picks up the quotes from all sorts of places, and makes them their own.

Take "Success is a peace of mind, which is a direct result of self-satisfaction in knowing you did your best to become the best that you are capable of becoming" -- John Wooden.

Or "Twenty years from now you will be more disappointed by things you didn't do than by the ones you did. So throw off the bowlines, sail away from the safe harbor, and catch the trade winds in your sails. Explore. Dream. Discover" -- Mark Twain.

Or "We must all suffer from one of two pains; the pain of discipline or the pain of regret. The difference is that discipline weighs ounces and lasts a moment while regret weighs tons and lasts a lifetime" -- Jim Rohn

Try this one on, "Keep the dream in front of you. Never let it go, regardless of how farfetched it might seem" -- Hal Higdon.

Or the gray haired mantra, "Once you're over the hill, you pick up speed."

Will they work for you? Only time, your time, will tell.
