





didn't want to write an article on the IMS because it has been so over played in both Excellence magazine and Panorama. I figured if I do it I would have to add a new twist...hence the dog.

I received the following letter from a PCA member and a few comments from LPR members regarding the recent settlement related to the failure of the intermediate shaft bearings on certain cars. Some of you have asked me for guidance and to comment on the settlement. With that, I thought I would publish this letter I received from Dan Newton, PCA member #2005031233 addressed to all the PCA region editors:

The house organ of Porsche, Christophorus magazine, proudly touts, "Where there's a Porsche, there's a race car" (June/July 2013 issue). The corollary should



be, "that did not finish." I find it strange that the recent classaction settlement for Intermediate Main Shaft (IMS) bearing failures affecting 2001-2005 986 Boxster and 996 911 engines hasn't received wider coverage. http://www.imsporschesettlement.com/faqs/#qq13

I have confirmed the links in Dan's letter; I have not confirmed that Dan is actually a PCA member. Notwithstanding that, the first link to the FAQ's related to the settlement really spells out the program. Essentially Porsche is providing the owners of affected cars a 10 year, 130K mile repair coverage with some reimbursement if an owner has had to pay for an IMS repair. So, if you can fit within all of the exceptions of the settlement I would recommend filing a claim.

My opinion on this is that Porsche just seems to have a very difficult time building a reliable engine for the majority of road cars. There were problems with 993 because of soft valve seals and secondary air passages clogging, and now with the 996/986 cars with IMS bearing failures. Porsche learned from the Japanese how to assemble modern cars beginning with the 996, it is too bad that they didn't let the Japanese teach them how to build a reliable engine. I know that people with Nissan GT-R's or Subaru STI's don't worry about catastrophic engine failure because of crappy internal bearings.

The owners of Turbo's, GT3's, and GT2's get the real Porsche competition engine that is unaffected by IMS problems. The rest of us got an engine more designed for the road and not the g-forces of racing. That is why we have the faux dry-sump lubrication system rather than the real one in the competition engine. All these engines have an IMS up until the 2009 model

year when the IMS was eliminated in the road engine.

An IMS is not a new concept; Porsche has been using one for years. The purpose is to slow down the chains that run the camshafts to ½ speed. The 2009 and newer run the camshaft chains right off the crankshaft at full engine speed, of course doing so brings about the problem of the durability of the chains. I am sure we will hear more about this when the 2009's start coming off warranty and the owners begin to pay repair bills.

The 996/986 cars affected by failing IMS bearings have an engine designed with a case that uses only one casting. Rather than a right side and left side there is only one piece that when reversed will fit together. With this design the camshafts must be run by chains at both ends of the engine, since the case is cast with the camshaft drive space incorporated. With this design one end of the IMS is slathered with oil from an oil pump that is proximate to the IMS bearing. That is not the problem end of the IMS. The other end of the IMS is near the clutch, an oil barren part of the engine with no pressurized oil flow nearby. With this end of the IMS Porsche engineers designed a sealed bearing that is meant to handle the task. The key is that Porsche engineers have continued to develop this bearing and now have 3 versions of this design. The first that was in most cars built from 1998 to 2002 had a double row of bearings, next was a much stronger bearing with a single row, and finally a 997 bearing that was larger and also single row.

My view is that Porsche understood the

weakness of the IMS bearing early on and began to repair cars by updating the bearing. There was good reason to do so because, although not mentioned much any longer, these cars also had a Rear Main Seal (RMS) that was prone to leaking. The RMS is right next to the IMS, so when they were in there it was an easy thing to check and replace. Porsche even went to the extent to at one point to replace the 996 IMS with the 997 version. This 997 upgrade is what took place with my car and what I think was done with most cars under warranty as well as the CPO cars.

My car was at the Porsche dealer for an ordinary service just before the warranty expired. I got a call from the service manager telling me that they needed to keep the car longer because they wanted to perform some additional repairs with a part "related to the valves". This was in the summer of 2006. I later found out the work was the 997 upgrade.

The upgrade takes the car to version 3 and involved removal of the engine, the splitting open of the case, the machining of the IMS bearing space, and the installation of a 997 IMS and bearing. It is key to know if this work has been done to your car because it will take you out of play for the LN Engineering or other retrofit kit. It is also good to know because the 997 upgrade is much more robust and likely to not cause any problems. My car has about 65K miles since replacement without any trouble.

The LN Engineering website will provide all the details of how to determine the health of your IMS bearing. It is important to cut open your oil filter to determine if the bearing is failing. A failing bearing will be evident by flakes of metal in the filter. Any of our advertisers who perform this service like Fremont Porsche or Don Wise can assist with this inspection.

Now for the dog.... The IMS will also make noise as it begins to fail. There are several YouTube files with this sound recorded. This is where the dog comes in. With a few treats and a good trainer I think that most dogs can be trained to alert on the sound of a failing IMS. It would be simple enough to take your dog for a ride occasionally to check your IMS.





LPR 2013 Family Picnic at Blackberry Farm in Cupertino Story by: General Patton




