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

# LPR's annual Swap Meet and Concours

he LPR team was out at the 23rd annual swap meet held in conjunction with Parts Heaven in Hayward.

The gate, which really looked more like a barrel with a sign, opened at 7am to let all the parts vendors and early buyers enter: notably a few who had been camped out since Zero Dark Thirty and at least one who tried to set up Saturday afternoon. Les Schreiber manned the gate this year. This is not a job for the faint at heart since it involves stopping cars and asking for money! The vendors eventually spread out down both sides of the street. This year we had 69 paid vendors, at least one cheap skate who conned his way in and possibly a few who snuck in from the other end of the street. This was historically a typical swap meet on a beautiful day in June.

By 8 am the Concours d'Elegance car dusters were starting to arrive and register with Peter, who was manning the Concours registration booth. Christina, a 1st place winner last year, came out to help get all 21 entrants catagorized and registered. Vince helped control the crowd during the event and assisted with organizing the awards.

It's fun to watch the competitors before judging starts. They're polishing, wiping, picking lint and sometimes even blowing dust off their Porsches in hopes of contaminating their neighbors chariot. Jim Davis was cool, confessing that his beauty wasn't really ready because

he went to Alice's Restaurant the day before and he got a little dust on it from that drive. He was unflappable as the others sweated through the judging. With 6 categories and 8 to 11 classes per category, almost everyone took home a trophy. The judging ended at about 1:30 with Al Ueno, our Parts Heaven sponsor, handing out the trophies. We had a few surprises and some questioned their placement but that happens every year. This year it was fortunate that everyone handled it in a sporting manner. There have been years where the sport came closer to boxing than a concours.

Meanwhile, back on the street, Bob Morgan and Kevin (Badass) Bennett were set up to man the food booth. Bob had hauled up the LPRs Weber up the day before and was ready to go early. LPRs booth was stocked with the usual hot dogs, soda, cookies, chips and water. LPR members sold coffee and sweet rolls to the early crowd. By 10:30 Badass fired up the grill and took over the cooking while Emperor Bob supervised and Farley monitored the action. While it may not be gourmet, the crowd still welcomes the fact that someone is there to feed them.

We were seriously short staffed this year and truly appreciate John and Angie Reed manning the sales. Angie did most of the hustling while John walked around pretending to take good pics. Old man Bill Jump rolled his Cayenne S up to the LPR booth to offer LPR goodies at 8 am. Bill was so proud setting what he considered a Goodie Store sales record - 4 items. No one had the heart to tell him we sometimes sell 6 to 8 items. Other LPR members showing up to offer assistance included Anne Roth and Dave Darling. And then we had a few groupies

come out to watch us work. The moral support is appreciated.

At the end of the day it was another successful swap meet with vendors and Concours competitors drifting out in small groups. A number a lucky souls managed to snag those critical parts they needed to fix their Porsches and many spectators left wondering "what's the big deal with all the old parts?".In other words, it was a typical successful LPR swap meet. It is the single biggest one day fund raiser the club manages.

he Four Points/Sheraton Hotel in San Jose was the starting point of the 73 mile "Drive to the Seventeen Mile Drive Tour" to our lunch destination at Roy's Restaurant at the Inn at Spanish Bay. Twenty Porsches participated in the tour. The weather was 70 degrees, sunny and beautiful, contributing to the animated conversation and happy anticipation of driving our Porsches on the backroads to Spanish Bay.

Our tour leaders John and Angie Reed, Kevin and Debbie Bennett and Farley their dog, organized our group into two groups of ten. Fluffy white Farley, a welcome participant, was on his very best behavior. Kevin confided that he exercised Farley before leaving home to calm him down.

From Santa Teresa Boulevard, we turned right on Willow Springs Road, immediately placing us in another world of rural winding roads with a pastoral scene of horses, grass fed cattle, and pristine meadows. When driving by Calero and Uvas reservoirs, it was amazing to see the substantial volume of water in the reservoirs. The view as we travelled down the mountain approaching Watsonville was especially beautiful as it was clear and sunny with fluffy white and grey clouds over the ocean. We passed the Gizdich apple farms near Watsonville. They serve a delicious Apple Pie a la Mode but not nearly as good as Debbie's Apple Betty. Driving through the Watsonville area down Highway 1, we observed

field after field of fertile land growing raspberries, strawberries, artichokes, and greens. Hundreds of crop pickers were hard at work picking this delicious produce. We appreciated the process of growing all these fabulous fruits and veggies available to us in Silicon Valley. The weather as we drove down the coast was fabulous, a perfect 70 degrees, no fog on this trip. We passed through the former Fort Ord area with its fine biking trails along the ocean all the way to Monterey. We enjoyed using these great trails.

We drove through the scenic entrance to the beautiful 17 Mile Drive with its dramatic pine trees for seven miles to Roy's Restaurant at Spanish Bay. Roy Yamaguchi, celebrity chef and James Beard Award recipient is known as the father of Hawaiian-fusion cuisine. We dined on delicious fresh Katsu fish sandwiches and wonton salads and outrageous cheddar bacon cheeseburgers with fries. The restaurant featured views of the Pacific Ocean and the Links at Spanish Bay as panoramic backdrops while we feasted on lunch. Don Gaspar de Portola, the Spanish explorer, discovered Spanish Bay in 1769 while searching for Monterey Bay.

After lunch some tour participants continued to explore the rest of the 17 Mile Drive, Carmel, Monterey, and Pacific Grove, while others went on a walk to explore Spanish Bay. We chose to explore Spanish Bay and were thoroughly delighted. Spanish

Bay Beach is a wide white sandy beach backed by sand dunes and the Links at Spanish Bay Golf Course. We made our way across the golf course, then continued to walk on a wooden boardwalk which meandered through the dunes making it an easy venture to enjoy the beach. It is situated on acreage that was occupied by a sandmining operation. The Links were built on this sandy wasteland in 1985 and were planned to protect the native dunes habitat and involved the restoration of native plants.

Surfers like Spanish Bay Beach but it's not a good swimming location due to strong rip currents. It was fascinating to watch a kite surfer utilize the wind and waves to gracefully maneuver midair

while surfing over the water with a large kite. We stopped in our tracks to watch. He performed high jumps in the air with amazing acrobatic skill. It looked very hazardous.

We wish to thank the Reed's and Bennett's for a great "Drive to the Drive" Tour, another well planned Reed-Bennett Production. It was a great event.
