It's hard to believe that I have twenty-five years in the club but it is certainly near that. I have participated in an enormous number of LPR activities over that span of years but my favorite type of event is the tour. I thought that I would reminisce a bit... maybe jog some memories and maybe even entice some explorations by others into the possibility of creating new tours for our LPR family. So, here are a few of my favorites from over the years.

Black Bart Tour – September,1996 by Rudi Herz

Rudi led the club to the town of San Andreas to celebrate Black Bart Days. Western costumes were encouraged along with participation in the event's parade. Tony Vanacore, dressed as a saloon piano player, adorned his Targa

roll bar with a printed piano keyboard and sat in the rear window area to play his honky-tonk piano while his wife, Kris, dressed as a saloon girl, drove the car while throwing golden-chocolate coins to the crowd. I rigged a coveredwagon look for my 914 and other cars were festooned with flags, patriotic paraphernalia or western stick-ons. Debbie and I both won the tour prize for best costumes. Dinner was held downstairs from the hotel's bar and Rudi, in an effort to keep Joanna's glass full, kept going upstairs to the bar, striking up conversations with ladies as he waited and bringing them downstairs to join our party, much to the amusement of many, including Joanna, who speculated, "Now what does he think he is going to do with them?" Top the evening off with the motorcycle clubs in town creating real havoc and real blood in the street and it was like a surreal visit to the actual wild west.

Farm Tour I & II - 1994 & 1995 by Dick Ducinni

The first incarnation of this series had the tour stop at a property, owned by the Montillier family, which was filled with junk vehicles of all kinds, including a huge multi-engine airplane. We got to examine their custom built car, dubbed the Montillier, Every part was custom manufactured by them with the sole exception of the transmission. It was created as a prototype for possible mass production and valued at one million dollars. This event ended with a meal at the home of Lew and Nancy Reader, Farm Tour II had us visit Jack Passy's 100' long, three story "garage" with the bottom two floors containing his current collection of 30 vintage cars, including an all original 1930 Lincoln with a mere 21K miles on it. The third floor was a warehouse of model airplanes, both just-for-show examples and the flyable kind, plus unassembled kits numbering in the many hundreds. This tour also ended at the home of Lew and Nancy Reader. Oh, and did I say that at the Reader's, on both visits, everyone was given the opportunity to drive three caterpillar tractors all around the Reader's extensive property? Unforgettable!

The Costa Rica Caper – January, 2008 by Joe & Cheryl Pruss

Unquestionably the greatest tour of my LPR tenure and one of my top two vacations ever. Joe & Cheryl provided for three couples in the amazing home they had built on the Pacific coast near Tamarindo, Costa Rica. They arranged to book an entire guest facility at a nearby golf course for the rest of the two dozen people who

joined in this adventure. The Prusses had spent a great deal of time exploring this tropical wonderland during the construction phase of their home and provided an amazing agenda of activities for their LPR buddies. We attended a fiesta in the nearby local capital of Santa Clara, where I was fortunately talked out of going into the arena to try and play tag with a bull (the ambulance parked right at the gate helped to dissuade me). The stands seemed so rickety that a good belch could have brought them down, let alone an earthquake. We ate in outdoor restaurants, at one of which the meals were cooked by a grandma using facilities that would have seemed modern two hundred years ago (and the food was delicious!). We visited a volcano and a jungle park with hanging bridges where we watched a trail of leaf cutter ants, marching in line and looking like tiny stegosauruses as they carried their cuttings. We cruised on a river, checked out the alligators and listened to howler monkeys as the boats touched the overgrown banks, thus allowing the little white-faced monkeys to swarm down to take the chunks of banana, used to entice them, right out of our hands. We snorkeled from a catamaran and ate at Lola's, a beach-front restaurant where I had my picture taken with Lola, the gigantic pig, for whom the restaurant was named and who could be found lolling nearby on the beach. New Orleans Tour – May, 2005 by Debbie Bennett

San Simeon Tour – October, 2013 by Reed – Bennett Production

I had visited the Hearst Castle several times and thought I was well acquainted with the attraction, but John Reed had heard that there were night tours and saw the possibilities. We booked it and were bowled over by the change in ambiance precipitated by the later hour. Escort Passport Max vs. Valentine One



Under the Radar: Who builds the best highend detector?

We live in a world increasingly polluted by radar. Automatic doors, trafficmeasuring devices, adaptive cruise blind-spot-monitoring control, and systems can all emit the frequencies used by law-enforcement agencies. To avoid the roadside tax collector while traveling at a brisk pace, radar-detector users need to distinguish the real threats from the noise.

We want to help you keep your record clean, so we tested two top-of-the-line models in ticket defense—the venerable Valentine One, our previous champ, and Escort's new Passport Max. With the help of the speed-trap-subversion experts at Laser Interceptor, a laserjammer manufacturer, we measured each detector's range with five radar sources in four different scenarios. We also tested sensitivity to POP radar and LIDAR [see sidebar]. Finally, to examine how these units deal with false alerts, we drove a 22-mile suburban loop and recorded the number of warnings each detector issued. Here's what we found:

In the era of disposable cellphones, the Valentine One's 22-year-old design can't hide its age. Don't write it off, though, because the simple shape packs clever, enduring engineering. You can install, adjust, and remove the mount with one hand, and the front-facing controls are smartly canted toward the driver.

Inside the magnesium case, Valentine has updated the V1's internals throughout the years to preserve its reputation as the most sensitive radar detector on the market, a title we're not about to rescind. (Admittedly, we haven't put it up against Escort's hyper-paranoid RedLine detector.) In each of our range trials, the V1 provided generous warning, and its second, rear-facing antenna—an exclusive in this test—gives it a leg up in rearward detection. The V1 also reported POP radar and laser alerts more consistently than the Passport Max.

One annoyance is incessant false alarms—the Valentine's filtering isn't very effective. On our 22-mile loop,

the V1 called out 53 threats in its most selective mode, which reduces but doesn't eliminate X-band alerts. Turning off X-band is an involved process that you wouldn't bother with on an interstate exit ramp. Determining what's a cop and what's not is left to the driver, who faces a steep learning curve to decipher the V1's bogey count, band indicators, signal-strength meter, and the signature arrows at a quick glance.

To reduce its chattiness, the V1 can be reprogrammed to ignore any radar band or to quiet K-band signals that are weak or located behind you, and a \$69 peripheral that plugs into your car's on-board diagnostics port mutes the detector below a set speed. Also, there's a \$39 concealed display that provides a mute button closer at hand. Still, none of this is as convenient as the Max's intelligent lockouts, auto mute, and standard plugmounted mute button.

As in its predecessor, the Passport 9500ix, an internal GPS antenna gives the Passport Max astute awareness of its surroundings. The Max's alerting behavior changes with your speed, and it automatically locks out false alerts after

you've driven by the same signal three times. (You can also lock out locations manually.) The result is a detector that's silent on your daily commute—until a cop sets up camp.

This newest and most expensive Passport uses a new type of digital signal processing (DSP), which can reduce false alarms from some non-police-radar sources. Think of DSP as a pair of Bose noise-canceling headphones for radar reporting. By reliably identifying noise, the Max can focus on real police-radar threats, leading to faster and more accurate warnings.

Even with its database cleared of known false locations, the Max proved adept at filtering radar signals, sounding only nine alerts on our suburban route in Auto No X mode. Its audible warnings are also less frantic than the Valentine's thanks to an auto-mute function that snubs the volume after the initial alarm. A mute button on the plug allows you to silence the detector without stretching.

The Passport picked out police radar as capably as the Valentine One, claiming the best range in eight of our 20 tests.





That said, the Max acknowledged only one rear laser hit, and we also had a close—but not costly—call detecting K-band radar around a bend. The Knight Rider—like status lights can be distracting, and we grew frustrated with a power plug that wiggled out of its socket three times in a month of use. The aptly named StickyCup windshield mount is covered in a gel adhesive tacky enough to make removal difficult at times, though we still experienced three accidental detachments. With only one suction cup, the heavy detector then crashed into the dashboard.

Although the V1's range matches or slightly exceeds the Passport's in some cases, the Passport's near elimination of false alarms provides a higher level of real-world protection. It's user-friendly for a first-time buyer but powerful enough for the most hard-core user.

Cheap Insurance

We'd be hesitant to jeopardize our driving record with anything less than the Escort Passport Max or the Valentine One, but the price of these high-end units had us asking the burning question: Can a \$100 radar detector save you from a \$150 speeding ticket? The short answer: Yes.

The long answer: It depends on how you interpret the results. Our test unit was the Cobra SPX 5400, and in most scenarios, its range was several hundred feet shorter than that of the Max and the Valentine. In our straight test, it picked up four of five radar bands less than 4000 feet from the source, while the more expensive detectors always gave more than 6500 feet of warning. Yet the Cobra still provided enough leeway to slow down before the radar

unit grabbed a speed reading—usually. In two of five around-the-bend tests, though, the SPX 5400 didn't warn us until we were within sight of the police car—a guaranteed ticket. The Cobra also exhibited lower POP and laser sensitivity than the competitors, though it did beat the Max by reporting four of ten rear laser hits. Whether due to the detector's deliberate filtering or its lower sensitivity, we recorded just four false warnings on our suburban route.

We bought our SPX 5400 at a \$30 discount directly from Cobra for just \$100 and, as the price suggests, this is a detector with few frills. Adjusting the mounting angle requires bending the thin metal bracket, and there are limited options for changing the detector's settings. Still, it's a better alternative to speeding without protection. Just know that while it doesn't report many false alerts, it may also inspire false confidence.



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

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
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
