# I Remember Ralph

### Ralph Maines May 17, 1926 - June 12, 2015

t was about twenty-five years ago that I struck up a strong relationship with Ralph Maines. At the time I owned a dry cleaning operation on Washington Street, in Santa Clara, and there was a little coffee shop next door where Debbie had coffee, I had morning toast in the early morning and where we later ate lunch. There was a table of coffee buddies that also congregated there every morning, of which Ralph was a regular participant. He also took his lunch there every day and this engendered the casual camaraderie of diner regulars that allowed opinions and light banter to float, mingling with the aroma of fresh coffee and frying bacon. One morning, Ralph boomed out to no one in particular, "Is anyone interested in buying a nice sports car?" Now, I freely admit that I am not a car nut. But as a teenager, I had been a

mild fan of the Triumph TR4 (I like that flat convertible look and the sound of the TR engines) and the Sunbeam Alpine (90hp and 100 MPH!). So I asked, "What kind of sports car." Well, I don't remember a satisfied grin, but Ralph knew he had a fish on the line. and within minutes I found myself sitting in "M", the favorite of his two, white Porsche 356C coupes as he hustled me on the virtues of the 356. Ralph had a friend who was selling a 356B coupe to free up space and funds to restore a race car (Lotus, I think) and that was how I came to gain possession of the Little Red Embarrassment.

I'm not sure how long he had been a member of Loma Prieta Region at that time, but he was certainly dedicated, because the day after I took the keys Ralph presented me with a membership



application for LPR/PCA (which obviously stuck) as well as one for 356CAR (which I let lapse after the first year).

Ralph was a bit of a tech guru when it came to the 356. He did all of his own maintenance and rebuilt not only his own car's engines, but those of friends. He was quick to offer his garage, tools, knowledge and even his labor in regard to 356 maintenance. He was a popular figure on his Santa Clara residential street. His garage door was always up as he tirelessly tweaked his beloved cars and he was always receptive to neighbors dropping by to talk cars, sports or car clubs. After I purchased the 356, Ralph moved from his usual lunch table to join Debbie and me and I can't count how many times one of his neighbors drove across town to

join us for a meal. He initially got me to participate in LPR events by having me attend and write up tech sessions. He was the tech chairman for the club for the first dozen or so years of my LPR membership. He kept the calendar full of tech sessions, rode herd on the PartsHeaven Swap and Concours, and drove countless miles, year after year, doing the monthly update of the LPR publicity boards located at the various advertisers found in the Prieta POST. For many, many years, Ralph was as ubiquitous a figure at LPR events as John Reed.

Ralph took a great deal of pride in both his knowledge and enthusiasm for the 356 as well as his dedication to the people and the success of the two Porsche clubs of which he was a member. You had to be careful of asking maintenance advice of Ralph. I remember one instance wherein the front brakes had locked up on the Little Red Embarrassment and I, of course, consulted with Ralph on the problem. In no time, he was over at my house with a box of parts and tools. I was aware of a problem with thirty year-old hydraulic hoses swelling and blocking off fluid flow and thereby causing this problem, but Ralph would have none of it. He insisted that we remove the individual cylinders on each wheel. break them down and replace the rings as well as hone the inside of the cylinders. He casually produced all of the accoutrements necessary for this rejuvenation process and oversaw me completing every step to his satisfaction. Hours later, the hydraulic system reassembled and the lines bled, we tried the brakes to find that they still locked up. Ralph nonchalantly advised

that we replace the hoses and that now we knew that the cylinders were good for another thirty years... and that was Ralph. Any time spent on 356 maintenance was time well spent.

As knowledgeable and active as Ralph was, he was not a braggart. He could have a touch a smugness, however. After a few years of Debbie and I being quite active in the club, I remember him telling me privately that he had brought in the best new member to LPR. It seemed out of character for him at the time, but I took it as a compliment and expression of affection. During the last decade, as his emphysema caused severe limitations to his activities. Ralph became ever more emotional and I can recall many instances of his eyes becoming moist as he expressed joy and thanks to all of the LPR members who have continued to include him in their lives while dealing with his limitations. I saw him about 36 hours before he passed and his last interaction with me was a strong squeeze of my hand and a final emotional expression of gratitude for all he had received from LPR and his

friends.

Ralph was a big part of my life. I know that many LPR members, like me, will miss him. Just ask around the valley.
