Editor's Letter

As Bob had mentioned we celebrate LPR's 45th anniversary this month. We have a team of volunteers that want to make the celebration a special evening for everyone, so make sure you attend. If you're over 60, or maybe more like 65, you might remember a television show called Rowan & Martin's Laugh-In or simply Laugh-In. This successful variety show was aired by NBC from 1968 to 1973 and was so popular that the old car people know that Pontiac even named a model GTO "The Judge" after a character in the show. Our LPR anniversary committee is bringing back the days when the club was founded and has put together a program using the theme of Laugh-In making it relevant to LPR and Porsche today. I remember watching the show and during that era it was hard to not know of it because of the catchphrases, one-liners, and skits that were talked about or often used.

For me the early 70's were not a favorite time in my life, but rather at time of dismay. I had lost my father and it was a time when I was adjusting to a new normal, much like I'm doing now. I'm fortunate to have older brothers and a sister who filled in the absence and helped make a difference in my life. I was a teenager, still in high school, and they made sure, along with my mother, that I was exposed to and given some wonderful opportunities at the time.

I had learned to fly at that time because I had won a scholarship contest in 10th grade put on by the Monterey Peninsula Airman's Association, a local flying club, for high school students that were enrolled in Aviation Science. My brother Eugene had had seven airplanes so I grew up around aviation and picked up quite a bit being around aircraft and flying along with what I had learned in class. With that, at 15, I had started Private Pilot instruction at the Salinas Airport. I remember my mother would drive me to the airport early on so I could take flying lessons. Once I achieved the Private Pilot license at the age of 17 my brother Dan at his law firm Hurd, Meyer, and Mitchell, that specializes in aviation law, wanted to make sure I was a safe pilot so he paid for me to continue flying and to achieve the Commercial, Instrument, and Multi-Engine ratings. The law firm had a multi-engine Cessna 421 that I have flown a few times.

Anyway it is important to know the context of learning to fly at the Salinas Airport because it was the location of my first LPR experience as I have been told.

On one very clear Saturday I was landing at Salinas Airport on runway 31, to my left on final approach I saw this group of cars at one end of the airport next to the drag strip. Yes, Salinas had a drag strip back then on one of the old runways at the West end of the airport. I drove my Firebird over after finishing my flight to see what was going on. It was a group of Porsches and owners who were running their cars through cones. At 18 years-old this was the first time I had seen anything like this. One of the fellows standing there watching a car run through this course had a dog that looked a lot like my dog so I thought I would ask him what was going on. My dog Chopper was a Norwegian Elk Hound, I remember the guy said his wasn't an Elk Hound and that the cars were participating, not in an autocross, but what they called it at the time...a Gymkhana. I had thought that was an equestrian term but it turns out that it is what we call an autocross but that on part of the course the driver has to use reverse to back into a space or through part of the course. I told this story to Ken Iles, who as you might know is one or our founders, who said "that was LPR". I said, " you have to be kidding." He said that LPR used the Salinas Airport for driving events in the beginning. Anyway, I was there 45 years ago, my first remembrance of LPR. Great story, huh?

Tech Session



Jacking Up Your Cayenne

This month we take the time to cover a simple part of the maintenance procedure that you will find useful to preform many repairs and upgrades on your Cayenne.

About one third of all tasks that you need to perform on your Cayenne require it to be raised off of the ground. While simple enough for the experienced mechanic, the procedure of lifting a 5000lb. SUV can be a bit unnerving for the amateur. In this chapter, I'll start out by showing you the best places to jack your car up and how to support it while you're working on it.

First, let's talk a bit about safety. Haphazard use of a floor jack can result in some pretty significant and expensive damage to you or your car. Before you begin raising the car, make sure that you have the wheels of the car blocked so that it can't roll. It's also wise to have your parking brake on as well, and the car placed in Park. You should always use jack stands in pairs to support the car: never just a floor jack. Even if you are only lifting the car up for a few minutes, make sure that you place an emergency jack stand loosely underneath the transmission, motor, or rear differential just in case the floor jack fails.

Before you attempt to begin jacking up the car, make sure that all four wheels are carefully chocked, and that the car is on a level surface. Keep in mind that if you raise up the rear of the car, the emergency brake no longer works (it works only on the two rearmost wheels of the car). If you place the car in Park, it will only lock the rear wheels as well. Place a few 2x4 pieces of wood in front of each of the wheels to make sure that the car will not roll when you lift it up off of the ground.

It's a good idea to use a soft rubber pad, cardboard or even a rolled up newspaper in-between the floor jack and the car to avoid damage to the undercarriage. Lift up the car slowly. It's perfectly okay if the car tilts while the wheels on the opposite side are still on the ground. Depending upon where you placed your jack, both front wheels may come off the ground, or both wheels on one side of the car may come off the ground. Lift the car up only enough to get the jack stand underneath while it's set at its minimum height. Place the jack stand securely under the jack support area, and slowly lower the car.

If you are lifting the front of the car, then place a jack stand under the front reinforced plate, lower the car onto the jack stand, and then repeat for the opposite side of the car.

Then jack up the rear of the car in a similar fashion using the underside of the rear subframe right in front of the differential. Jacking the car up from this point will raise the entire rear of the car, allowing you to set both rear jack stands in place at the same time. Set the height on the jack stands to be the same as the ones for the front. With the car supported on all four jack stands, you can carefully repeat the whole process to raise the car higher if needed.

Safety is of paramount importance here. Never work under the car with it suspended simply by the floor jack - always use jack stands. Always use a backup jack stand wherever you place your primary jack stands. One tiny flaw located in the casting process can lead to a jack stand breaking - and having the car fall on top of you. If you are going to remove the wheels from the car, be sure that you loosen the lug nuts before you lift the car off the ground: otherwise the wheels will spin and you will have a difficult time getting the lug nuts off. Take the wheels and stack them in pairs underneath the car: this is an added measure of safety in case something fails.

Once you have the car up in the air and supported on the jack stands, push on the car and see if it is unstable on the jack stands. If the car moves at all, you do not have it properly supported. It is far better for the car to fall off the jack stands while you are pushing on it, then when you are underneath it. Set the floor jack underneath the engine or transmission while you're working as yet another backup support. Again, it's a wise idea to set up a spare jack stand or two as a precautionary measure against one of them failing.

When you are ready to lower the car, be aware of where you are placing your floor jack. Sometimes you will not be able to easily remove the jack when the car is lowered, or the jack handle may crush or damage part of the chassis or something else on the way down. Proceed very slowly and also be aware that some floor jacks release very quickly. Also be careful to place the car in gear, or to engage the parking brake before you lower it. The car may have a tendency to roll away right after its put back on the ground.

1. Shown here are the jacking point locations just behind the front wheel on a Cayenne. The metal edge along the outside (green arrow) is intended to be used with the factory jack that comes with the car. The edge fits into a cup on the jack. You should only use this jack to change a tire and nothing else. To secure the car on a jack stand, use the reinforced section just inboard of the factory jack point (yellow arrow).





2. This is a picture of the car being raised with the factory supplied jack. Remember; only use this jack if you have to change a tire in an emergency situation and do not have a proper floor jack available.

3. Shown here is the cross member directly behind the front jacking points (green arrow). This reinforced area is where you should place your floor jack.

4. Place a piece of rolled up newspaper or cardboard in between the floor jack and the cross member and carefully jack the car up enough to place a jack stand under the reinforced section at the front.

5. Here is the jack stand located directly under the front jack point. Once the jack stand is in place, carefully lower the car down until it rests on top.



6. Shown here are the rear jacking points on the Cayenne. These are located just in front of the rear tire. The yellow arrow shows the metal edge for the factory supplied jack while the green arrow shows the reinforced area where you should place the jack stand.

7. As before, here is a picture of the factory supplied jack lifting the rear of the Cayenne. When using this jack, make sure that the edge of the body fits into the cup of the jack.

8. Because of the proximity of the two rear jacking points, there is no place to use a floor jack and then also place a jack stand. Porsche realized this problem and issued a technical service bulletin advising to jack the rear of the car up from the rear subframe point (green arrow) directly under the differential mount.







9. As before, place cardboard or rolled up newspaper in between the floor jack and the subframe. Once in place and centered, carefully lift the car up enough to place jack stands under the reinforced areas on both sides of the car.

10. Here is the jack stand supporting the car under the rear jack point. Once the jack stand is in place, carefully lower the car down until it rests on top.

by Lake Berryessa, down to 128 by Rutherford, right at Pope Valley for a quick visit to Langtry Winery established in 1888 by Lillian Langtry, a flamboyant British theater star. The picturesque estate consists of 22,000 acres and straddles both Lake and Napa Counties. Vineyards are limited to 400 prime acres. Langtry Estate and Vineyards has the distinction of being both the oldest and largest winegrower in Lake County. Their generators were down from the weather, so we only stayed a little while and returned on Sunday. Onward to Highway 29 to Clearlake, back roads and then left into Konocti Growers event center.

I Have Good News

Hey, calling all Porsche owners. I have very good news. The Western World has turned its back on car culture.

That was the headline for a piece that appeared in early February on Quartz, a digital news outlet for the "new global economy" that originates in the UK.

The writer, Leo Mirani, makes a very compelling case. He cites data compiled by Schroders, an asset management firm, which show that car sales may never recover to their pre-recession peak.

Why? Two things; urbanization and smart phones.

Young Americans are getting their driver's licenses later than ever. And many, on both sides of the Atlantic, are not getting their licenses at all.

What they are doing is living in urban meccas; some two-thirds of American "milenials," those born after 1984, for example, live in cities today. And 40 percent of them say they have no plans to migrate to the suburbs like their parents did, a generation ago.

For them, cars are simply not relevant as a status symbol. And getting a driver's license is no longer a right of passage.

What is important to them is the smartphone... and apps... apps that enable real-time access to public transport and private services like Uber and Lyft. Owning a car, then, becomes an unnecessary expense.

According to the research, smartphones also cut car use by allowing people to stay in contact, virtually. And that, in turn, then reduces the number of trips people take. The author cites a researcher at Microsoft who notes that what the drive-in was to teens in the 1950s, and the mall was to teens in the 1980s, social media are to teens today. And you don't have to go anywhere to play.

Then there's e-commerce. If your supermarket delivers for a nominal fee, or Amazon brings your on-line purchases to your door, still more trips are obviated.

And the story's similar in emerging markets. In developing economies, increases in car sales have led to gridlocked cities. And that's often due to minimal or a complete lack of urban planning. Take Beijing, please. Or take Delhi, which was recently cited for the worst urban pollution on earth.

In response, governments are pouring vast amounts of money into urban transit.

Where that leaves market growth for the automobile is anyone's guess. In point of fact, signs are emerging that these economies will follow Western examples and adopt new technology... app technology.

And that will, quite possibly, lead to what's called "structural stagnation" in the developed world's auto industry... with the preponderance of vehicle sales driven by replacement demand. What to do?

Stop! No, go! This is good news! Here are the implications the researchers failed to acknowledge.

You won't have to teach your teen how to drive. Which should add 10 years to your life, minimum, if only as a result of decreased blood pressure.

And, if they don't have a license, you won't have to endure the scene of watching them pull up to your house, with the radio blaring, and your child engaging in multiple conversations with friends, by text and voice, simultaneously. Or wonder where they really are, when it's prom night and they've called in to say they're alive and well.

Add another 10 years, minimum.

You won't have to lay out the cash for your kids' first wheels. I remember doing the down payment for the first vehicle that both of my daughters bought. Will they do the same for their children? Hardly likely.

You'll have more room on the road. When the bulk of transportation is provided by app-based services, along with Smartcars, rapid transit and, let's face it, it's inevitable, self-drive vehicles, lanes will open up before your eyes, traffic will melt away and it will be smooth sailing, up to and through that favorite sports car loop.

You'll be able to pick up that dream ride for a song. Because demand will drop through the floorboards.

And those lightly used resales will proliferate. Because great gobs of baby boomers will soon be moving into assisted living facilities, where transportation will be taken care of... by livery services. And all of their used toys will flood the market... making the cost of entry lower than ever before.

And what of the social stigma of driving a machine that's, out and out, made for performance? Let them eat their hearts out. In the greater scheme of things, we'll be a drop in the bucket, a rounding error in a vast sea of automated mechanization. Hardly anyone will notice. And those that do won't care.

Oh yes, the dream Porsche of your life. For less than you ever dreamed possible. On roads that are clear of congestion. It's a whole new era for us lucky few, the automotive enthusiasts of the planet.

We're trending to very good news, indeed.
