

At one time he held every U.S. freestyle record from 220 yds to one mile. I spent a summer with them and they taught me to swim when I was 13. First, you develop a strong kick. So I enlisted a few participants to help this year and I think we have some interesting new stories for you. If you've never been to the Swap Meet, the Parts Heaven sponsored Swap Meet is the place to be on the 1st Sunday of June. It's sorta the start of the summer Porsche season. And LPR is the club that starts it all off. It's sorta a free for all GTG with a Concours. car show and tech session thrown in.

So I'm gonna tell you all about it and all the great people who help out with LPR's single most income generating day. Starting with a giant thank you. We couldn't do it without you. Specifically- but not a complete list in order to hold down POST page count;

Les Schrieber, our Zone 7 Concours chair, who manages the Concours part (net LPR income \$744)

Jim Bryant manages the vendor slots (net LPR income \$ 1950)

Jennifer Bryant manages the early morning coffee and donuts and gets the food booth started. At 6 AM!

Kevin and Debbie Bennett who took charge of setting up and running the Food Booth (net LPR income \$ 900) Bob and Karen Morgan brought the BBQ grill, tables, pop-ups and a coffee pot, coolers, etc.

Other key players included Emilie Highley, John and Angie Reed, Ken and June Iles and our own POST editor and Goodie Store manager, Bill Jump.

Me? I picked up the drinks and ice for the food booth, helped Les and Jim Bryant mark off the street on Saturday afternoon and helped with the Concours registrations and parking. I brought the drinks up Sat. afternoon because they filled the back of my Highlander. And I left the house about 6 AM to get to Smart & Final in Hayward in time to pick up the ice for the food booth, then help set up before heading over the Concours area.

Kevin picked up all the food this year and Debbie provided baked goods and cookies for sale. That's another truck load of supplies. Jim also schleps up the BBQ grill and takes it home after the show. Bob and Karen also showed up at the crack of dawn to help set up. Bill brought up and manned the Goodie Store booth all day. While he didn't sell a lot, Bill probably signed up a few new members and along with everyone else, represented LPR proudly all day.



This 1988 CE has only traveled 19,300 miles and is in "like new" original condition. It is fully documented including the factory window sticker and CE badge. The exterior is Diamond Blue Metallic Paint with matching Fuchs: a shortened shift lever & luxury carpets.

Our adventure to the 61st Porsche Parade in Jay Peak in the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont began on a dark but clear June 18 morning around 4:30 a.m. Since we weren't driving our Porsche to the Parade we must be flying or hitchhiking, we opted for flying. From the S.F. Airport our first stop was the airport in Montreal, Canada, where we picked up our rental car, checked the mobile GPS and headed out for the two hour drive to Jay Peak. More on the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont later.

Crossing the border into Vermont was interesting. This wasn't your big-time crossing location but a relaxed one man operation. The American border patrol officer was sitting on a lawn chair outside the small enclosure he called home for the day. He asked if we had any vegetables or tobacco, what were we doing in Canada, what was our purpose for visiting Vermont and if we had any dead Squirrels inside the car. Moments later and a friendly wave goodbye we were on our way, the last time we crossed the border from the U.S. into Canada (Escape 2010, Sun Peaks) we were pulled over and guestioned inside for a few minutes, what a difference here. Thinking back, smuggling a bushel of brussel sprouts across the border is an interesting thought.

4 p.m. and immediately went to the wrong hotel, ours was a half mile or so down the road, the Hotel Jay. What? You've never stopped at the wrong hotel ever? With this little mishap under our belts we checked into the correct hotel and headed for our room. What a pleasant surprise; a large living room, a full size kitchen, a separate bedroom and an enclosed sitting area outside the living room. We just hit the great hotel room-rate jackpot.

We ventured out to find some food and ran into LPR charter member Terry Zaccone and long-time Sac. Valley Region member, Rik Larson. We hadn't as yet seen Tom and Sandy Provasi but this encounter was soon to happen. After dinner while chatting outside our rooms (Terry next door and Rik two doors down) Terry offered us a hit off of his oxygen bottle as we helped Rik find his room. Not that we're all old geezers but we've been in PCA a long time. Dr. Ferry Porsche was a teenager when we joined!

Parade registration began in earnest on Sunday morning. The Ice Haus, yes, Virginia, an ice rink, was converted into the hospitality room where hundreds of PCAers from all corners of the U.S. and Canada gathered to receive their packets with info about events that they signed up for, ours was simple: Three dinner meals, the gimmick rallye, a boat ride and lunch on Lake Champlain and a visit to an opera house on the American and Canadian border. No autocross or TSD rallye this time around. OK, you caught me, we don't

We arrived at the Parade resort around

autocross or TSD rallye, but quite a few attending do.

Onto the Concours Monday morning: The setting was the golf course directly across the street from the hotel. Every Porsche model, from the oldest to the newest, was on display and waiting to be judged. If you've never seen a Porsche Parade Concours than you've never seen some of the world's most beautiful Porsches. Some say that Concours people are crazy; if that's the case then the crazies have the most breathtaking Porsches vou'll ever see. Of course this was the time that my camera decided to malfunction, but not before I snapped photos of most cars, none the less frustrating. One Porsche of special note: Ralph Maines '64 356A. Ralph was the owner for 42 years, the car was sold shortly before his passing. The Porsche was completely restored, judged and admired by all stopping to take a look. Ralph, if you're reading this, your baby is in good hands and shines beautifully.

Monday evening was the welcome party around the outdoor pool, the boisterous crowd gathered en masse to enjoy the gourmet buffet and the socializing which is always a big part of a Parade. We met several folks from other regions and enjoyed talking about families, Porsches, our part of the country, Porsches and more Porsches. Toss in a few good laughs and the evening came to a conclusion. Beginning on Tuesday the driving tours began as well as the TSD Rallye. Most (all) of the guided tours for the week were filled by the time I got around to signing up but there was an alternative self driving tours, 19 self-driving tours

to be exact. This was our clue to get out and see the countryside of Vermont. During registration on Sunday we grabbed two tours and today was the first opportunity to hit the trail and see what's what and where what's what is located. We didn't realize fully what a treat these tours would be.

Remember the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont? It seems that back in the late 1940s business here was very slow, so. how to attract people to the ski slopes? Simple, come up with a P.R./marketing gambit that grabbed people's attention, hence the Northeast Kingdom idea which encompassed four adjourning counties was born. The gambit paid off. Business boomed and the rest is history. Off we go into the depths of the Northeast Kingdom: Our first outing was titled The Vermont Back Roads Driving Tour, a four part adventure with highlights in several villages along the wav.

We stopped and explored the Old Stone House Museum in Orleans, never found the Lyndonville House of Pizza but loved the village, ate lunch in St. Johnsbury, sampled cheese at the Cabot Creamery in Cabot before heading back to the hotel. The winding least traveled two lane roads were marvelous. The landscape and trees were a brilliant green. Rolling farmlands with silos and an occasional encounter with an Amish buggy added to the scenic atmosphere that was always just around the next turn.

Upon returning we said our congratulations to TSD Rallyemaster Rik Larson and his crew for a job well done, we didn't see too many torches and

pitchforks headed his way!

Tuesday night was the Concours Awards Banquet. The event was held in a very large tent, similar to that of the Monterey Parade, I guess tenting is the wave of the future (or not). The food was very good and our table mates, Tom and Sandy, were a pleasure as always. Dignitaries spoke, jokes were told by the emcee, door prizes given out and the Concours awards presented. There was one very special award, Sacramento Valley Region was presented with the PCA Region of the Year Award and those of us from Zone 7 applauded the loudest; as the clock struck midnight we headed out, via the shuttle bus, to our hotel. I knocked on Terry's door and asked for another whiff of his oxygen bottle but he refused, saying he was changing the oil in his car and couldn't be bothered.

Wednesday was a breezy, rainy day in the 70s as we drove the Toyota (gulp!) out for another do it yourselfer, and this time it was the Shelburne Museum Tour. This tour not only had written instruction and a map but photos as well, Porsche drivers need all the help they can get. This was also the first day of the autocross and we felt bad because the weather had taken a turn for the worse, but they soldiered on as did we in our drive to Shelburne.

More scenic byways, more scenic countryside and at times the rain came down in buckets. Never say die and eventually the sun broke through as we approached Shelburne and Burlington, the capital of Vermont. We found a quaint restaurant (everything's quaint in Vermont) for lunch, chatted up the locals (they said Californians were weird but friendly) before heading back to Jay Peak. Weird? Who us?

Upon returning we inquired about the autocross and, although soggy and somewhat miserable the sun did come out later on, all who participated seemed not to mind, well, maybe a few snarled but what the heck.

That evening was the Rallye banquet which we did not attend but we heard later from Sandy that the Prieta POST was awarded second place in its class in the newsletter competition, congrats to Bill Jump and his band of dedicated helpers. Note: The newsletter competition awards were moved from the Concours banquet to this venue, why we don't know, but it's better than the ice cream social which was the case at the '08 Parade in Charlotte, NC. "And the award for the best newsletter in the double dip cone competition goes to..."

Onward to Thursday and the Gimmick Rallye. Unfortunately, we ran into a snag when we picked up our rallye envelope at the start, this event was a covered bridge map rallye and the map was too difficult for my navigator to see or read. What to do? When dealt lemons make lemonade. We hiked up to the Ice Haus and into hospitality and grabbed another DYI tour, this one to Stowe and the Trapp Family Lodge. We shouted, "lemonade anyone" as we drove out of the parking lot and another driving tour adventure. Californians are not weird but they do like lemonade!

Thursday was also the second day of the autocross. The weather couldn't have been better. The rain was long gone and the blue skies crystal clear, the sounds of Porsches competing to the max were music to the hills. And nary a snarl was heard. Parade autocross top guns Tom and Sandy did not compete this time around and I decided to give those in my class a break by not showing up. Right. For those in the know go ahead and belly laugh!

Onward and outbound: The long and winding roads to the Trapp Family Lodge located on the outskirts of Stowe was once again spectacular, we felt like we were locked into a Norman Rockwell painting – quaint (again) villages dotted the landscape, roads snaked through pastoral farm country and there was more brilliant green everywhere we looked. When we arrived at the Trapp Family Lodge (remember the von Trapps of Sound of Music fame?) we decided to tour the grounds and the interior. This setting and appearance of the lodge inspired me to ask Angie to throw her arms into the air, spin around, smile and sing, "The hills are alive with the sound of music." She just stared at me in disbelief, walked away muttering something about what I could do to myself. Gee, it was only captain and crew were very friendly and a suggestion and besides, I'm not that flexible anymore!

The village of Stowe was bustling with tourists, us included. Although there were many restaurants and gift/antique/art shops scattered throughout downtown Stowe maintained an aura of a small village that attracts people from (mostly) the east coast and Canada during ski season. We found a local restaurant for lunch and enjoyed watching the bustle of people walking past, talking, laughing and having a great time in this beautiful setting. Waving goodbye to Stowe and the Trapp Family Lodge we took our time driving back to Jay Peak, the two lane

roads and all they encompass were too good not to drive at a leisurely pace.

Back at the hotel we asked how the gimmick rallye went and it seemed everyone had a good time plotting a course to seven covered bridges, taking selfies to prove they did it and returning with score cards in hand. Kudos to Ellen Beck and volunteers who once again did an outstanding job with this low-key/ tour gimmick rallye. This event has been a success since its inception in 2005 at the 50th Parade in Hershey, Pa. We ran it then with Bob and Karen Morgan in our (gulp!) rental car, but we can say we were there for the inaugural running of what's become a very popular Parade event. Friday, for us, was lunch on board The Northern Star sailing on Lake Champlain. The lakeside village of Newport was the setting. There were 30 of us parade participants who met at 10:30 a.m. on the pier and had our names checked off the manifest before boarding (we did cross into Canadian waters eventually). We sailed promptly at 11 a.m. The knowledgeable about everything Lake Champlain, both the U.S. and Canada sides of the water. Lunch was first class. The guests, us 30, were enjoying talking and getting to know one another better during the three hour cruise. No, we didn't end up on Gilligan's Island with Mary Ann and the Professor! After returning we once again enjoyed the drive back to the hotel.

Saturday, June 25 the last day of the Parade. We were in for an unexpected treat when we were told that the ski tram was repaired and available for rides up to the top of Jay Peak. This ride was free for those wearing their Parade name

tags, a nice touch from the hotel. We were among the first, maybe the first, to iump on board and marvel at the overall picturesque views on the way to the top. Our driver pointed out New Hampshire to our right and New York to our left. We stayed a few minutes walking around, OK, we got off the tram and then walked around seeing what we could see, and what we saw was dramatic vistas from every advantage point. A nice ride up and back and we thank the hotel for the invite Tech Quiz, held on Friday, were handed to do so.

Next up was the drive to the Carswell Opera House in Derby Line and the Parade of Porsches to get there. This is a good way to have two events at once, see the surrounding country for those who hadn't as yet done so, show off a few hundred Porsche to the locals and visit an historic opera house located on both sides of the U.S. and Canada border. We tried to avoid getting into the line of Porsches but somehow we did, every Porsche model known and one Toyota Camry drove the 45 minutes to Derby Line and our final destination.

competitive events but events of the non-competitive nature, which wasn't the case many moons ago, after Ken Iles was born!








