PRIETA POST

his is about that great man- Steve Mitchell.

I had the chance to get to know Steve quite well over the last few years as a result of our LPR connection, of his love of cars, and then interactions following his illness resulting in transfer of the Post to me. We bonded heavily. I am writing this to pay homage to him via a profile of his life which I hope will illustrate what a remarkable man he was in so many ways. Let me count the ways that give additional insight to this great man-first this text, then Bob Frostholm's Ode, followed by photos through much of his life..

Family- This was a huge part of Steve's life. He was born in San Francisco. He was so devoted to Jackie, Matt and Melissa 1. Jackie and Steve were an "item" in High School- Salinas High was the place. They got married in 1975. Steve worked while he went to college at USF and then to Law school (after work and online). They moved to New Jersey in 1993 where Steve worked for HDS. Steve was active with the kids- giving tender love and care to Melissa 1 and doing man things with Matt as he grew up. They returned to California in 2000. A recent highlight of the family was when Matt and Melissa 2 got engaged and were then married in Las Vegas in December 2015. Great amounts of love and care went to Melissa 1 for her special needs and it was a great shock when she unexpectedly passed away this last spring.

Steve was interested in his ancestry but his family did not have a lot of available history. He was a late comer in the sibling pecking order. He was born some 20 years after his closest brother and he had at least one nephew that was nearly his age. In the last year Steve became more interested in his heritage. He knew his mother was Czech. He thought he likely was also Scotch but really wanted to know if he had Italian blood (which family lore suggested). He asked me about DNA testing (which I had done to establish relationship to another Jump) and I related what he could learn and how easy it was. Since he wasn't doing match to another person it was basically a haplogroup test. What's that? It tells you the rough geographic area of your ancestry based on testing of other people and what their known country of origin was. He ordered the test kit about 2 ½ months ago and the test results were to come in mid August.

Cars- Steve's middle name should have been RPM. He was a muscle car guy from the get go. We LPR folk have been to the Hahn Winery down west of Hwy 101 and over the hill to Carmel Valley and Cantina for lunch on an LPR tour. Steve told me that area west of Salinas was where he loved to go hot rodding. We would associate Steve with Porsche. However, in the beginning it was muscle cars, then shortly after they got married they bought a '69 Cadillac (nickname: The BatMobile). He had been advised by his Attorney brother that attorneys should have Cadillacs. In later years he

liked BMWs and bought several. One is with Son Matt- a BMW Z3 Roadster. Jackie's car is a BMW 5 Sedan. Along the way came that lovely silver bullet- the 2002 Porsche C4S. He ordered that from the factory and waited 6 months for delivery. That was his daily driver here in California and commuted up to Hewlett Packard for work. He loved to maintain it- change the oil, paint the brake calipers driver and I knew that it wasn't really etc. In addition to cars- Steve was a pilot of light aircraft when he was a young man. As a matter of fact- Steve actually obtained his light aircraft pilots license at age 15, before he was licensed to drive. Jackies' father worked at Laguna Seca and she worked there in some summers. Good fit for Steve.

After his illness was diagnosed surgery followed, then other rough treatments. It was a blow to Steve mentally as well as physically. But he battled with all his might. A few months later my wife and I were at Steve and Jackie's for lunch with John and Angie Reed. Steve was restless. At one point he announced that "Bill needs to go for a ride". I don't think Jackie heard him or she would have said no driving. Steve knew how much I had ogled his C4S and we had talked a lot about the virtues of that machine on the road. I had thought that he had not driven since the operation and subsequent treatment. So we went out to the car and drove out over the hill to the west to the backroads. Along the way to do the same and Steve followed. he said he needed to go out and take the squeak out of the brakes- I suspect he had gotten it out and driven it "under cover" or he would not have known about that brake squeak. So over the hill west onto narrow two lane back roads

we went. At one point we were rolling at 90 MPH and headed for a 15 MPH hard left handed right angle turn only about 150 feet away. I could feel a bit of adrenaline rush as we approached the turn- no time for fear. Steve negotiated that turn braking, shifting and steering with amazing precision. It was just an amazing demonstration of his skill as a about the brakes. It was demonstration to himself that he still had the moio. He had it.

After that I looked at hundreds of used 911s on the internet. I made many plots of price vs year, mileage etc. I was looking for that perfect machine at the perfect price. One day Steve called me to say that a local C4S was coming on the market and was I interested. I said yes but had to do some nurturing of the idea at home. I have been very satisfied with my Cayenne S but wanted to limit miles on the SUV. So Steve set me up with the connection that led to my purchase of a very low mileage 2004 C4S at a great price. Thanks Steve, that's my daily driver at around 5000 miles a year.

One of the things Steve obsessed over Mobil 1 vs Royal Purple for the C4S oilnever resolved. He had told me about Kevin Laird's great blog on his C4S and I read it. discovered that Kevin had his oil tested (Blackstone Labs). I decided This reveals a lot about your engineespecially if you have a 996. Just do it. Kevin did it, I did it and so did Steve. Along the way I found out that Steve had been a student of my Cousin John Kuhn in Industrial Arts at Salinas High. Steve

referred to him as "Mr Kuhn". My cousin finished his tour of duty at Fort Ord in 1956 and had an Austin Healy 3000. I thought that was the cats meow. I would take my college lady friends down to Monterey/Carmel for the weekends so we could toodle around in that 2+2 Healy. That gave me the bug for a sports car. As noted, Steve led me to that 911 C4S 2 years ago.

Professional Career- Steve got his law degree at Monterey Peninsula College of Law and went on to work for a law firm in New Jersey and then companies such as Hitachi Data Systems, NetManage, and Hewlett-Packard. Steve handled intellectual property law in software at HP and was heavily involved with contract development and licensing of HPs software. I was an IBM guy for 48 years, 40 in management and involved with patent screening at times. I can assure you that this is a very complex work effort and no place for dummies. When I first started working with Steve on the Post he proudly showed me his certificate that entitled him to practice before the Supreme Court. Steve often spoke to me about his work in this area. He was a brilliant man.

Dogs- Steve loved dogs. In his young years he had a dog named Chopper. You will see a photo of him giving the dog a bath with gusto. You will also see him with Chopper & another family dog. About 18 months ago, he told Jackie they needed a dog- she ultimately consented. They found the Redwood Forest Cavalier Breeders in Humboldt County that has the Cavalier King Charles Spaniels and ultimately brought Maggie home at 10 weeks old in June 2015. That was their 41st Wedding Anniversary present to

themselves. Maggie was named for his Grandmother. Maggie was good for Steve's soul and often took her for walksalso good for Steve. Look for Maggie and the C4S on the cover of the 2015 Post. Maggie went with Steve for treatments and wore her LPR "service dog" tag on her harness.

Travel- Steve and Jackie traveled to interesting places. Steve traveled on business but also took Jackie to Italy, France, Hawaii, and to Australia about 3 years ago. In his youth he also had been to Czechoslovakia with his mother where she immigrated from at age 19. Her parents had been killed in the war and she came to the US alone. He and Jackie were able to travel after finding an alternate location for Melissa 1.

Faith- Steve was a Catholic and a member of the Knights of Columbus- the Catholic Fraternal Service organization. The Order is dedicated to the principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism. The order has a hierarchy of 4 degrees. Steve was a holder of the 4th degree. He had held the position of Grand Knight. He was quite proud of his involvement and service.

LPR- We all know about Steve's love of cars- that fit in well with LPR. He did a great job as the Post Editor. He set up Magcloud publishing (advantage- free digital and Apple iOS compatible plus print) and doggedly held on until he could not proceed due to his loss of energy as his disease progressed. He won multiple National awards for the Post. He went to AX school with the C4S and burned through his Michelin tires that weekend. Later he switched to Sumitomos at less than ½ the price of the

Michelins. Coming home from the Keystone Parade with the Reed's and others he rolled down a section of a wide open Wyoming road at 140 MPH, making the others in the travelling caravan a wee bit nervous. No problemtop speed is over 175 mph. Good as long as you don't hit a deer or even a jackrabbit. They were actively engaged in LPR. And traveled to several Parades. Jackie was an LPR VP and Member at Large. Steve was nationally known for the Post and was a newsletter judge.

Poker- Steve began Poker at an early age with his brothers as some photos following will attest. He extended this passion to LPR and played every two weeks with some LPR buds, who rotated the host location. Bob Frostholm describes this setting and his friendship with Steve in his great Ode to Steve following this article. I suggest you analyze if he was poker faced or not.

Outdoor Sports- Steve enjoyed the outdoors a lot. He liked golf. We tried to get to a little outing at the driving range but weren't able to make it. He also liked to scuba, ski and go around in his Bermuda shorts and flip flops. He liked

photography. Early on in the transition of the Post over to me he pulled his photo bag out and showed me his Nikon F and accessories. I think that got displaced by his Samsung phone in later years. He did a little handgun shooting at a range.


Goofball- Steve was a gregarious fun loving guy as a complement to his brilliant analytical side. Take a look where he is pretending to drink charcoal fluid and to topple trees.

That's the man as I knew him and as through the lens of personal contact, history in photos and with Jackie filling in a few blanks- what a guy! He was great in many dimensions. We will all miss him. I'm grateful I had a few years to get to know him.

I recently met former Seal Team Six Member Rob O'Neill. I took a Seal Team Six book written by two other Seals with me to be autographed by him. Follow the arrow, where he wrote:"NEVER QUIT". Thats what Steve did. Never forget HIS courage. lost my friend today. There wasn't enough time to say goodbye. There never is.

Some friendships are lifetime. Others are fleeting moments. Steve's seemed like a lifetime, but in the whole scheme of things was far too short. It was the kind of friendship; you know... the kind of friendship where words needn't dominate. Just hanging together doing guy things brings a comradery...a sense of comfort and ease. Guys get it but we can't explain it.

I lost my friend today.

We met Steve in May, 2008 at a GTG brunch in Santa Cruz. He and Jackie were new to the club, Deb and I were newer. The four of us had somehow, independently migrated to a lone table in the front yard while other club members cajoled around the food and played pirate buccaneer on a catwalk connecting the host's two adjacent homes. We admired the views and sunny morning weather. A conversation began. Important stuff first. You know, stuff like which ride is yours? Where do you live...Gilroy? Really? Yes, people really do live in Gilroy we discovered. Steve was loud and gregarious. A bit intimidating at first, but it was clear that inside was a big Teddy Bear of a man with a heart of gold. The morning progressed and the more we talked the more connected the four of us became. Cars, careers, children with special

needs, values....Somewhere in that haze of *getting to know you*, the PCA Escape to Albuquerque, 4 months away, turned into a commitment to jointly plant the Loma Prieta Flag on the Sandia Mountains. It was a done deal. These new friends we'd known for an hour or so...well by the time the day ended, we'd known them for years. Steve was that kind of guy.

Over the next 4 months we'd meet up at various club events and plan our road-trip. As it turned out, our final plans didn't quite match, as Steve and Jackie were taking a week to get there, sightseeing along the way and our plan was to sightsee on the return leg. But it worked out well. At the welcoming dinner at the Albuquerque Marriott, Steve told us all the places to stop on the way back and those to avoid. He liked telling people what to do...but if you knew Steve, you already know that.

Our friendship extended beyond the club. It became less about cars and such and more about just enjoying one another. He was a brilliant man. I don't mean Steven Hawking IQ brilliant, I mean our Steve could parachute into a party anywhere in the world and carry on a conversation with anyone, whether a statesman, or a plumber. He wore his heart on his sleeve. He cared about people...I mean REALLY cared about people, and as we've seen these past couple of difficult years, people really cared about Steve. I lost my friend today.

Steve and I played poker every other Thursday night for the past six or seven years. You get to know someone really well at a poker table. You learn their "tells"... small unconscious physical movements that give away the truth about when they're bluffing and when you should fold. Steve's poker tells went something like this. He would say. "I have a great hand. You guys should all fold." When we did, he'd show a garbage hand and if we stayed, he'd have 4 aces. You just never knew with Steve. He kept his poker face throughout these past tortuous months. So Long, Steve. He was always positive about the future, whether a new drug, a revised chemo treatment or a surgery. He was determined to lick this horrible disease he called a minor inconvenience.

I lost my friend today....

We spent a couple of hours with Steve and Jackie a few days before he passed. Steve remained the trooper he'd since the beginning; telling everyone what to do. He even showed us how he broke the table that cantilevers over his bed. The demonstration was a laughable moment. But quite ingenious. That's Steve.











Engine Oil Analysis Story by Bill Jump

iven the concern about 996 engines failures I think it is wise to have your oil tested when you have it changed.

I got this tip from Kevin Laird's fine blog Steve's 996 report and have seen Kevin which is based on his 996 C4S. Steve Lairds report as well. Despite my focus pointed me to this blog 3 years ago on the 996 it is a valuable tool for other when we were discussing IMS bearing vehicles. Kevin's C4S has in excess of issues and the vulnerabilities of the 996 144.000 miles on it now. standard engine. Turbo Engines are based on the Metzer design and do not have this Here is a link to his blog and latest issue.

The oil report provided by Blackstone labs gives you a great read on basic engine health.

Blackstone provides sample bottles free of charge. The sample is only about 5 ounces and should be taken when the oil is drained at time of change. The kits come with a simple data sheet that asks about mileage on the engine, change interval, oil type, make and model of the car. The kit is basically a self-contained mailer with the data and sample bottle inside.

It normally takes only a few says after receipt at the lab to get results. You will get a PDF report eMailed to you as well as hard copy. The report provides measurement data and comparative data. It provides an additional level of data beyond physical inspection of your filter and your magnetic drain plug. Refer

I have had oil tested on all my 3 vehicles (911C4S, Cayenne S, Buick Sedan). I have

WILLIAM: Thanks for the info. This is a great second sample for your Porsche and the 3.6L engine under its hood. This sample saw quite a bit more use than the last, and there's some more metal as a result. Still, these levels are quite low compared to our averages, so we're not seeing any signs of mechanical issues on the horizon. The only unusually finding (besides the very low wear) was the trace of fuel that turn up. However, this amount is harmless and is likely from normal operation or maybe from sampling just after starting the engine. Excellent report!


