

They had already carted in meat, buns, wine and miscellaneous other accoutrement necessary for a successful outdoor fete. Jim and Lin Metz were also present and industriously aiding in the preparations for this picnic extravaganza. Hal had what appeared to be a 100 pound bag of charcoal briquettes that he poured into the fire pit of the grill. 

Bascom Upholstery Tech Session Story by Peter Ridgway Photos by John Reed and Bill Jump

ith 13 club members in attendance, John Wardell, Bascom's general manager. began the session by telling everyone John was only 18. 35 years and 3 how much he enjoys the Prieta Post and this month, he especially enjoyed the article on our Cheesy Charity Tour in the July issue. Seems the picture of the Point Reyes Vineyard took John back to his childhood days where he spent summers in West Marin. John told us how his great uncle actually built the house that is now the Point Reyes Vineyard tasting room. While John grew up in the Bay Area, he spent summers in West Marin with family and pleasantly remembers that house.

Talking about family got John to tell us a little about Bascom Upholstery. It's a family business started by John Bascom almost 40 years ago. John Wardell went to work for John Bascom when he was 18 and when John Bascom passed away a few years ago, became general manager, running Bascom Upholstery with John Bascom's twin son's Perry and Ryan.

John Bascom started the business working out of the back of his VW beetle in 1977 doing vinyl repair and dve work. Business grew and he shortly added pin striping. Initially,

most of the business was with car dealers and repair shops. He hired John Wardell as a driver when locations later, Bascom Upholstery is a full service shop with business pretty evenly divided between retail, insurance work and commercial accounts.

Ryan and Perry are usually with us for tech sessions but were unable to make it this time. Since we were talking of family. I stopped by the shop a few days later to ask them about family history. On the web I found out that Ana Maria Bascom was one of San Jose's first settlers and that Bascom Avenue is named after her. Ryan and Perry don't think they're related but in my always helpful way, I suggested they talked their lawyers to see if they were owed any rents or royalties from all the shops along Bascom Avenue. Good luck guys.

Bascom Upholstery has been an LPR sponsor and advertiser for years and we all know it's the place to go for first rate auto upholstery, Convertible and Targa top work, leather and vinyl repairs and auto audio on our Porsches. I'll talk more on the car audio and electronic later. Those categories cover too

much to mention in this article so I suggest you check out the details on their website, under services. I was surprised at all the things they cover under those four major headings (http://www.bascomtrim.com).

Those of us at the Tech Session. also learned how Bascom can help us with more budget friendly restorations. For instance, when we toured the "dye" area of Bascom's 13,000 square foot facility, we learned that Ron, Bascom's dye expert for 34 years, can take old worn and cracked seats and make them look almost new again at a fraction of the cost of replacement covers. Something similar is true for convertible top replacement. Bascom works with a number of after market shops that provide as good and often superior top kits for a fraction of the OEM costs.

As an example of of repair work, Russ Britschgi brought a worn seat out of his Mercedes that had a small tear to see what they could do for him. Per Russ, "the repair was accomplished by gluing a backup piece of material to the underside of the tear and then filling the area where the torn leather was butted together. They also did some dye work to try and get things to match the excessive wear with the rest of the seat. I'm trying to keep it in preservation class (that arrested state of decay that is called "patina"),

not restored full concours.

I am pleased with the outcome, and the seat looks a lot better without that major rip at the top edge of the seat. If the repair holds up I will be very pleased and I will go back for other work. "Russ noted he originally thought the \$380 cost was a little high but checked with a friend who had the same work done 7 years ago for \$290, so not too bad. To fully recover would have been over \$1000. And then the other seat would need to be redone.

So if you're thinking of any interior work, give the friendly staff at Bascom a call and see what they can do for you. And remember to let them know you're part of LPR. It's worth a club discount.

One of the things I always appreciate is the discussion about insurance work. This topic is always worth the price of admission to a Bascom Tech Session. Bascom works directly with all major insurance companies and generally can justify full OEM replacements for any damages covered. This isn't always the case with some shops. Along this line, John shared the story about a BMW OEM dashboard they were replacing. We didn't get the exact numbers but the OEM dash must have been at least \$3000 from BMW. The labor was going to be between 18 and 24 hours plus Bascom had to replace or repair arm rests and door panels.

Maybe over \$11,000 in all. Why? It seems the owner was taking his cat to the vet and the cat went crazy in the car! We were wondering what a small pet carrier would have cost.

Speaking of insurance issues, did you know that if an object, say a deer, runs into your car, your insurance will cover it under Comprehensive. Where as if you run into the same deer while driving, it's considered and accident. There is a difference. Just saying that muffler that came flying off the freeway and smashed your Porsche front end could have cost you a lot more to repair, IF you had hit it while driving.

During the tech session, we saw a few cars under repair. A Maserati owned by Neil Peart, the drummer for rock band RUSH, is being completely restored. The engine was at a local shop being rebuilt. The car had just been repainted when it was brought in. Mostly what everyone saw was the massive rat's nest of wiring hanging out of where the new dash will soon be. No one could imagine how all those wires could be reconnected. Fortunately, Bascom's guys can. We also noticed a SJPD cruiser in the shop. Someone suggested we put Les in the backseat if he got frisky. Never happened, but John shared with us that Bascom does all the interior repairs for the

city and many Bay Area counties commercial fleets. Not a small amount of business. I was talking to Angie Reed during this discourse and she thought there must be a lot of seat repairs since cops wear those heavy utility belts and get in and out of their cars all day long. That's got to be a lot of wear and tear.

Finally a few words about "car audio" which covers the whole world of car electronics including Nav systems, new heads up displays, and driver aids like lane departure warning systems and camera systems. When I first spoke to John about the tech session, I suggested we focus on these systems. A great idea that will require significantly more planning than we had this time. During my follow up shop visit, I spoke with Darryl, Bascom's auto sound and electronics master. Darryl's another long time Bascom team member, having joined in 1997. He noted how much car electronics has changed in that time. It used to be just radio's, then 8 tracks, cassettes and CD's. Now a new Porsche comes with **PCM (Porsche Communications** Management) which handles all entertainment, navigation, front, rear and side monitoring, back up cameras as well as provides monitoring of all the cars electronic systems. And in case you haven't looked closely at a new Porsche,

it's all electronics. My Macan PCM the OEM radio will run between manual is 2" thick with tiny print. But \$1500 and \$2000 installed. These systems frequently have AUX input

I found it fascinating that older cars, Porsches included, can be retrofitted with a variety of new electronics to provide most of the modern electronics we'd all like to have. I'm still trying to get information on Magellan's newest Roadmate system introduced last year at the CES show. It supposedly provides GPS based navigation as well as front and rear cameras, sensors that let you know how close to objects you are Bluetooth connections and more. So far Magellan hasn't made this system available as promised. I'm guessing they're having software problems since it has so many features. Anyway, I'm still fascinated and will continue to follow up. Hopefully, I'll get a focused electronic tech session in the near future.

To give you some idea about costs for all this fancy electronics, Darryl noted some very rough pricing guidelines. Bascom is a Pioneer dealer but can provide most other brands. A good aftermarket audio/ Nav system that fits in place of

the OEM radio will run between systems frequently have AUX inputs that accept rear cameras that are activated when the car shifts into reverse. Front cameras can also be mounted and are usually switch activated. These systems usually have 7" displays that pop out and flip up. Unfortunately, most of these flip up displays block your AC vents or access to controls. We'll keep looking for alternatives. Another popular electronic feature is Bluetooth connectivity. Why? Because you can connect most of the features of your smart phone to the car to give you alternative GPS navigation, things like streaming audio (a la SiriusXM) without the monthly costs.

A parting word of caution, not everything works for every car and there are frequently compromises required. If you want to have a front camera installed to keep from replacing your spoiler when you hit those parking curbs (again), it's best to make an appointment with Darryl to see what's your options are.



We will dine in a private Porsche-themed room in which to enjoy the camaraderie that's always LPR!






