

I saw a recent news story about the San Mateo County Community College District. The gist was that a community college (junior college then) education



was once tuition free in the State of California, there is a push, coming out of Sacramento, to return to those halcyon days, and that in San Mateo County, thanks to its stellar property tax revenues, 19,000 of the 33,000 county-resident students who attend the county's three community colleges pay no tuition. When asked about expanding the tuition waiver to all San Mateo County residents, Chancellor Ron Galatolo, who heads the system, agreed that such would a laudable goal, but that he was concerned that many of the students receiving free tuition still had to deal with the cost of books, transportation and miscellaneous fees. He then went on to talk about how K-12 schools have government meals programs and when disadvantaged students enroll in community college that benefit goes away.

There is a term that has come into vogue in the last few years; "Nanny State". It applies specifically to government limiting choice to individuals, not for their immediate safety, but for what the state has decided is for their own good. Examples would be limitations on smoking, online gambling and recent movements to increase the cost and limit the size of sugary drinks. What Chancellor Galatolo seems to be advocating is a another form of government overreach, what, in this case, I would christen "The Mommy State."

With rare exception, the students attending community college are legal adults. When you reach the age of eighteen you can vote and enter into contracts. Many states allow drinking and gambling at that age. Why, just because you are pursuing more education, should the school system be relieving you of minimal responsibility for adult life? It's jarring enough to have to take on all of the responsibilities of adulthood after high school, but the idea that you

should be insulated from having to provide your own sustenance while attending college just strikes me as wrong. It's no wonder that I hear stories of the whining graduates who are so disillusioned about their inability to find their dream job after graduation. They're having their hands held and their little rear ends powdered for them for 20 to 25 years and then, suddenly, they have to take responsibility for themselves? I'd probably whine, too.

Galatolo is overreaching. His responsibility as chancellor is to provide education. His \$160 million a year budget should be spent on just that, education. Instead, he is considering spending a portion of his budget on welfare for the 19,000 students whom he favors over the rest of the student body. It is a choice that I feel is beyond his purview but is typical of the push of ambitious bureaucrats with large budgets, coupled with insufficient supervision and accountability, to empower themselves and their agency under the guise of good intentions.







guided us through a tour of the facility.



Vintage Porsche Event Calendar

If you happen to be interested in the historical side of Porsche, here are a few events that should be on your list for 2017. "Vintage Porsche" is basically air-cooled, pre-1999, which covers 356, 911/912, 914,



and the race cars 550 to 962. These events can provide a wealth of knowledge of Porsche History: the Cars, the People, and the Memorabilia.

Time to Start Planning to Attend

March 2-5 is the L.A. Weekend, and if you have the stamina, there will be an overload of things to do, all vintage Porsche related.

Starting off with two days of "open houses", restoration shops, dealers, parts suppliers and others. They range North (Sierra Madre's warehouse in Burbank) to South (California Porsche Restoration's shop in Fallbrook). In between there are about 12 other shops to visit, plus some special invites that have yet to be listed. Most try and make the 11-2 lunch at John Willhoits in Long Beach, BBQ Brats. 
