about these things. It can also be for good things like new children, new homes, special occasions, a major lottery win, etc. Sue and Emilie's email addresses are in the front of the POST.



One of my go-to complaints from the last decade has been how over-protective parents have become regarding their children. The most visible example of this is the morning and afternoon traffic



found around schools. I don't know the actual percentage of parents complicit in this apparent coddling of their kids, but I recall that during my elementary school days there was only one child picked up by parents after school. The seeming motivation for this parental transport is to protect the child from predators, a subject I have touched on in the past as a hugely overblown risk.

I recently read about a school bus accident in Texas wherein a student died. As a result, there is a movement afoot to mandate that school buses be equipped with lap/shoulder belts, at a cost of \$8000 per bus, a sum which advocates maintain is well worth the money to protect every school system's youthful charges.

25 million kids ride school buses every day during each school year and 5 to 6 die each year in school bus accidents, making it a 4 to 5 million to one shot that a child will die in a school bus in any given year. To put his in perspective, in the U.S the odds of being stuck by lightning are 700,000 to one. A school system in Maryland has responded to this movement by asserting that they have never had a student death in their bus system and the installation and maintenance of this equipment on their buses would cost \$1,000,000 per year. But still the advocates push. It reminds me of a radio talk show where the subject was the \$90 million project approved by the Golden Gate Bridge District to put a net under the bridge to prevent the dozen or so annual suicides by jumpers. The basis of the conversation was whether the expense was a justifiable allocation of public funds. A caller asserted that even if it saved just one life, the expenditure is worthwhile, indicating the complete lack of sense of proportion common among these well intentioned advocates.

It may have been as much as forty years ago that the student self-esteem movement also started. Grading systems got fuzzy

so that students wouldn't be traumatized in failure. Trophys began to be awarded for participation rather than achievement. Political correctness mandated that everyone had the right to not be offended, and in the case of students, actual policies were put into place for enforcement. George W. Bush's No Child Left Behind initiative effectively mandated that the greatest effort in education be directed toward the lesser lights, again, placing greater value on mediocrity that on excellence.

What has been the result of these protective steps? The nation has produced a couple of infantilized generations with a high percentage of individuals who are not capable of dealing with disappointment... think rioting after Clinton lost the election; generations who were unable to see through the fatuous and simplistic promises of solutions to their woes by Donald Trump; generations who are so convinced that they are correct in their beliefs that they resort to violence to keep anyone from publicly airing an alternate view; generations who are so disinclined to think critically that they are willing to get their news from Facebook, Twitter or elsewhere on the web and ignore the fact that such news may be dubiously sourced.

The vitriol running through the national dialogue has risen to an alarming level. I can't help but think it is in large part because entire generations are being pampered to such a degree that they are either too lazy or too self-centered to consider anyone but themselves in their decision making.



Banking on the Indy 500

The weather on May 28th was lovely, blue sky and warm. We gathered for our 11th annual celebration of speed at the Moffet Field Golf Course Restaurant. Les Schreiber, John and Angie Reed, Chris Huergas and



Jim Davis, Kirby Hollis, Ed Tefankjian, Dave Darling, Ken & June Iles, and Bob & Karen Morgan were all ready to plunk down their \$5 for a chance to pick the winning driver. Peter Ridgway and Jim Bryant were there too, but they were in a risk-averse mood and wouldn't part with any wagers.

If you're not familiar with the Indy 500 it is a 500 mile race on the 2.5 mile oval (so 200 laps = 500 miles). The 33 fastest drivers are selected during several practice and qualifying sessions in the weeks before the race itself, which is traditionally held on the Sunday of Memorial Day weekend.

Why do we care? There are no Porsches involved (there was only one Porsche-powered Indy car, and that was in the late 1980's), so who gives a @#!*? I dunno, it's probably just a good excuse to get together and have some fun with friends. To be honest, most everyone is more involved with their conversation than with the race itself, but we have a little scheme in play to pique some interest every 50 laps.

We collect \$5 for each driver pick. Many people want to improve their odds of winning and pick 2 or more drivers. We ended up with a pot of \$170 to play with. The past few years we have been paying out 20% of the pot to whoever picks the leader at lap 50, then again at laps 100 and 150, and then the race winner at lap 200 gets 40% of the pot. It is not unusual to have several people pick the same driver so they split the winnings accordingly.



picked him either so the remaining \$68 went to those who picked the runner-up, Helio Castroneves.

We all enjoyed the comradery and playing for money adds some excitement as well. Congratulations to all the winners and to the others, better luck next year!





gold on the glass objects before putting them into the kilns to bake. Also, in the kiln rooms we could see the forms that are used to make bowls and the unique dishware that look like open clams or waves. 

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


September 17 International Drive Your Porsche Day.
