Thought I'd let everyone know what went on regarding the swap meet this year since the minutes reported the voting but no details.

First, understand that the PartsHeaven Swap Meet is LPR's only fund raiser. It is not an LPR club event. The swap meet accepts anyone who pays for a vendor spot. Less than 5% of the vendors are LPR members. LPR runs a food booth providing generally hot dogs and drinks for the vendors and attendees. We also host a Zone 7 Concours at the same time. So, lots of people and a good time atmosphere. LPR typically nets about \$1200 to \$1500 after expenses. This goes toward supporting club events like the family picnic and the year end Awards Banquet. All good.

This year the City of Hayward raised the street closure fee to \$3000. Last year it was about \$2000. This is the third large hike in 3 years. LPR normally splits the fee with PartsHeaven but the increase caused PartsHeaven to want to substantially raise the fees we charge the vendors to cover the extra \$1000. We raised vendor fees from \$25 to \$30 last year and got a fair number of complaints. Reasonable since many vendors are just folks selling off a few extra parts.

We simply couldn't raise fees enough to cover the closure fee. We get about 60 to 70 vendors a year. 60 vendors at \$30 each only gives us \$1800. Bad weather would reduce the number of vendors. LPR was at serious risk of losing money for this event. Since it is fund raiser

club event. board decided it would and NOT your fiscally prudent not to hold the be swap meet. PartsHeaven then stepped up and volunteered to split the \$3000 fee 50/50 with LPR with the understanding that this will be the last time unless Hayward gets reasonable. The swap meet has been an LPR/PartsHeaven event for 27 years. A real tradition which generates lots of positive attention for LPR. So the board okaved the event with LPR on the hook for only \$1500 to keep the tradition "one last time".

Hopefully, since there is still some danger of losing money, we get a good turnout this year. It's a lot of work for the club. We need 5 to 8 people to man the food booth, a couple of people to help with the Concours and 1 or 2 people at the gate collecting money. We mark off vendors spots on the street Saturday afternoon. 2 or 3 people have to buy all the food and then haul it up to PartsHeaven at 6 AM Sunday morning, plus tables, the BBQ grill and other supplies. At least 3 car/truck loads. Then, afterwards, clean up and haul everything back. Like I said; LOTS of work. We have a few brave volunteers who've been doing most of this work every year, supplemented by a few others who help out when available or under duress when pressed to contribute. Great people but still a lot of work.

Bottom line is that if we're not going to make money at a fund raiser, we shouldn't be doing it.

By the time you read this the swap meet will be over for 2017 and whether it continues depends almost entirely on Hayward's street closure fees. I've been working the swap meet for years and hated to see things go this way. But I thought everyone should have the story. Hope this was interesting for you. If anyone has thoughts I'd like to hear them. Also maybe ideas for a new fund raising event. Peter

Over the last few election cycles I've heard many attacks on the perceived notion that some states with a conservative bent are working to limit voting rights. The argument from supporters of this



trend is that they want to eliminate voter fraud, yet there is very little evidence that such fraud exists to any significant degree. It seems a reasonable argument that the presentation of proof of identity at the polling station is not an overly onerous requirement for voting and it would provide a simple filter against people voting fraudulently.

On the other side is the argument that qualified voters can and will be deprived of their vote. A recent article in the Mercury-News delineated the tales of numerous voters who were turned away when they failed to meet the requirements of Wisconsin's new picture ID law. Of course, the suspicions of the left are that the real purpose of these anti-voter fraud laws is to make it difficult for supporters of the liberal agenda, many of whom are poor and otherwise disadvantaged. Being a pragmatist, I can't help but feel that there is an element of truth in their position, but what I can't understand is why these liberals don't go after the granddaddy of voter disenfranchisement: the loss of voting rights by convicted felons.

Civil rights activists have consistently pointed to the disproportionate representation of black men in the prison population. Whether the cause of this inequity is due to racism, socio-economics, or something else, the simple fact is that literally millions of men, encompassing a large segment of the male black population are unable to vote because of criminal records created in large part during their volatile coming-of-age years.

A strong argument can be made that a primary factor in these criminal statistics is the unemployment rate of black youth, placed at 51% by Bernie Sanders in July of 2015. With time on their hands and no income, it is almost understandable that many would fall into crime. It is, of course, no justification for breaking the law,

but having done so, been caught, and served their time, their felony record leaves them barred from using their life experience to influence the direction of the nation's laws and judicial procedures because they have lost the right to vote. For instance, felons might favor pursuit of drug users for felony prosecution, because putting white users in prison, rather than just black dealers, might actually make some progress in the exercise in futility that has been the war on drugs.

It is hard to come up with a remotely current example of where such a coveted civil right has been stripped from U.S. citizens, let alone in such a wide spread and cavalier manner. Yes, it is easy to say that the problem is one of a felon's own creation, but I just don't see the value to the country of permanently disenfranchising millions of people for criminal behavior when the end goal of the justice system is rehabilitation. With the exception of pedophiles, our society has repeatedly shown a willingness to forgive individual transgressions of almost any nature. It seems odd to me that, in this regard, there is no forgiveness for felons and that there are no advocates for change to this almost casual abrogation, for so many, of what is commonly regarded as one of our most fundamental rights.

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






There is a \$10 per car fee to cover the Fellowship toll and necessary supplies for our journey.

Follow the road through Marina approximately two miles south of town. Turn left at (Imjin Road) signal into Marina Airfield. Turn right after the first large building on the right and follow the cones to the autocross site.

At my table, we were joined by three people, a former soldier, his wife and his mother. Umbrellas spread over the outdoor tables set with pale blue table linens, white napkins, flowers on the tables, real plates and silverware. There was an open bar when we arrived, serving sparkling wine (where you could have a raspberry wine added if you wanted to add a little flavor) for starters, 2 or 3 different reds, at least one white, but all were good.

The buffet opened promptly at noon, and a good thing, since everyone was very hungry. They called the tables one at a time, so we weren't all rushing up at once. Ours was the last table called, but the food was very good and worth the wait. We had seasonal fruit, an array of muffins, croissants, chicken apple sausage, poached salmon, rosemary roasted potatoes, artichoke and spinach frittata plus a strawberry shortcake parfait cups for desert.

If you haven't made this tour before, plan it for next year. The actual drive is not long, the brunch is excellent and the beautiful scenery at this time of year is well worth the commitment.


